## **GENERAL**

### **Status**

The High School of Dundee is administered by a Board of Directors. Formerly a grant-aided School, it now enjoys independent status.

The Constitution of the School is embodied in an Order in Council of 1965 and forms part of the Education (Scotland) Act of that year. This consolidates earlier Acts of Parliament pertaining to the School. The School was granted a Royal Charter in 1859.

It is a fee-paying co-educational day school of approximately 1,100 pupils, of whom 700 are in the Secondary Department and 400 in the Preparatory and Junior Departments.

The Rector is a member of the Headmasters' Conference.

### **History**

The history of the School goes back to 1239 when the Abbot of Lindores was instructed to build a Grammar School in the new burgh of Dundee. Famous pupils of the Grammar School in early times were William Wallace, the Scottish Patriot and Hector Boece, first Principal of the University of Aberdeen. In 1589 the School received its first permanent home in St. Clement's Lane, where it remained for exactly two hundred years. In 1789 it shared a building in School Wynd with the English School which had been founded at the beginning of the century. Another school, Dundee Academy, was opened in the Nethergate in 1785. The three schools were united in 1829 and in 1832-34 the present school was built to house all three.

### **Buildings and Grounds**

The School is situated in the centre of the city and is housed in a complex of buildings standing on adjacent sites. The Boys' School is a listed building of historic importance. There are two extensive and well-equipped playing fields in Arbroath Road, approximately a mile from the School.

### **Educational Aims**

The High School of Dundee is a predominantly academic school. Each year the vast majority of pupils go on to University or to other forms of further education. High standards in academic fields are, of course, only part of a wider purpose; there is a wide range of out-of-school activities, many carried to high levels of achievement, and a strong corporate life — both essential to the education of the whole pupil and to the development of a sensitive and discerning personality.

## **Organisation**

The whole School shares the same complex of buildings, but is organised administratively in three separate departments; Preparatory, Junior and Senior. Pupils admitted at any stage proceed as a matter of course to the following stage.

## **School Hours**

The School Hours extend, in the case of Class L.I, from 9 a.m. to 12.45 p.m.; in L.II to L.VI from 9 a.m. to 3.10 p.m.; in the other Classes from 9 a.m. to 3.55 p.m.

An interval of One Hour is allowed for luncheon; Juniors 12.5 p.m. to 1.5 p.m., Seniors 12.45 p.m. to 1.45 p.m.

## **PREPARATORY DEPARTMENT**

### **Introductory**

The Headteacher of the Preparatory Department is directly responsible to the Rector for the organisation and administration of the Department.

Boys and girls aged from four and a half years to eight years receive their education in this department which is housed at the West side of the Main School in a recently modernised suite of rooms, consisting of six large classrooms and two ancillary rooms. All the rooms are bright and very well-equipped.

An excellent teacher/pupil ratio is maintained by the seven full-time teachers in the department.

### **Organisation**

There are two classes at each stage of Lower I, Lower II and Lower III. Pupils normally remain with their classteachers throughout the week except at times when they are taken by specialist teachers for Physical Education (L.I, L.II and L.III) and Class Music lessons (L.III). Small groups of pupils or individuals may be taken for extra classwork when required — for instance after absence due to illness, or whenever extra tuition is needed.

### **Curriculum**

A thorough grounding is given in English, Arithmetic and Handwriting. In addition to these basic subjects, the children have instruction in Creative Work (Art and Crafts), Nature Study, Infant Science, Religious Studies, Physical Education and Music. In Lower III History and Geography are added to the curriculum.

Each classroom has a library of books to assist the pupils to develop and improve their reading skills and there is also a departmental library.

## **JUNIOR DEPARTMENT**

### **Introductory**

The Headteacher of the Junior Department, assisted by the Second Head, is directly responsible to the Rector for the organisation and administration of the Department.

Boys and girls aged from eight years to twelve years receive their education in this Department which is accommodated in the East Wing of the Main Building. All rooms have been recently modernised and refurbished.

An excellent teacher/pupil ratio is maintained by the nine full-time teachers in the department.

### **Organisation**

There are two classes at each stage from Lower IV to L.VII, each class having both boys and girls. Pupils are taught mainly in groups with provision being made for pupils of differing abilities. The work of each stage is co-ordinated by a senior teacher who also shares in the teaching of the groups.

### **Curriculum**

Instruction is given in English, Junior Mathematics, History, Geography and Junior Science, in which subjects a balance of class, group and individual teaching is maintained.

Religious education is given to all pupils. Art, Gymnastics, Singing and Sewing are the responsibility of specialist teachers. A varied extra-curricular programme is offered in sport and other activities.

The Departmental Library is well provided with books for the use of both staff and pupils.

## **SENIOR DEPARTMENT**

### **Introductory**

Education in the Senior Department is offered to pupils aged from twelve years to eighteen years.

The facilities available to pupils at this stage include well-equipped Science laboratories as well as Computer and Language laboratories.

A good teacher/pupil ratio allows pupils to be taught in average to small groups.

### **Organisation**

In each Form from Form SI to Form SVI pupils are arranged alphabetically in Groups of about twenty-five, each looked after by a Group Teacher. Pastoral care is also provided by the two Form Teachers in charge of each Form as well as by Senior Staff.

At the end of Form I pupils are set by subjects to allow them to proceed at the pace most suitable to them.

All pupils are prepared for the Scottish Certificate of Education examinations, both Ordinary and Higher Grades. In addition in Form VI preparation is also offered for Certificate of Sixth Year Studies, Oxford/Cambridge Entrance and Scholarship and University Bursary Examinations.

### **Curriculum**

Religious Education, Music, Gymnastics and Games are part of the syllabus throughout the Senior Department.

In Forms I and II pupils study a wide range of subjects in common : English, History, Geography, French or Spanish, Classical Studies, Mathematics, Science (i.e. Chemistry, Physics, Biology), Technical Subjects, Home Economics and Art.

In Forms III and IV some choice of subjects requires to be made, although the courses still retain the character of general education. At this stage specialist courses in Music, Art, Economics, Computer Studies, Secretarial Studies, German and Greek are introduced.

In Form V courses assume greater specialisation which is further accentuated in Form VI. Special arrangements obtain in Form VI in order to prepare pupils specifically for tertiary education.

At all stages the widest range of subjects is offered in addition to a very wide range of subject combinations.

## **ADDITIONAL INFORMATION**

### **Homework**

Great importance is attached to the careful preparation of Homework. This is held to be a discipline in itself and forms an integral part of schoolwork at all stages.

### **Additional Subjects**

In addition to the subjects of the curriculum instruction may also be had in Pianoforte, Orchestral Instruments, Singing and Voice Production, Speech and Drama, and Dancing.

### **Games**

A wide variety of games together with swimming is on offer as a time-tabled activity from the Primary 5 stage upwards. In many of the games the School fields a large number of teams to suit the various age groups. As well as team games individual sports are fostered. All pupils are expected to take games unless debarred on medical grounds.

### **Extra Curricular Activities**

Clubs and societies of all types flourish especially in the Senior Department. The Literary and Debating Society is very

active and successful. Training is offered for the various stages of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme. The Chess Club attracts pupils of all ages. There are two Brownie Packs and a Company of Girl Guides. The strong Cadet Contingent with its Pipes and Drums is well-organised and very popular.

The "Friday 9" period offers a wide range of extra curricular activities in terms of clubs, hobbies, and leisure interests. In most sessions the following activities are available :

After the Certificate of Education Examinations a special Summer programme is arranged for the Sixth Year. Activities available are canoeing, sailing, camping, shooting, hill-walking, board sailing, orienteering, grass ski-ing, weight training, jury trials, special lectures, theatre visits, leisure cookery, typing, technical, computer studies, modern languages, local history, electronics, Cadet expeditions, contemporary affairs, leisure dressmaking, knitting, helping in the Preparatory Department and the School Library, using facilities at the Games Field, helping at Old Folk's Homes, Children's Centres and Hospitals.

## Music

The School enjoys a strong musical tradition. Opportunities are available at all stages to take part in choirs, instrumental groups and orchestra. Pupils are also trained for the Associated Board and Trinity College Examinations.

## **Speech and Drama**

Pupils are prepared in Speech and Drama and Effective Speaking for the Trinity College Examinations.

## **Careers**

The careers advice system is available to all pupils in the Senior Department. There is a well-equipped Careers Library, and experienced careers staff and Form Teachers work together with the assistance of outside speakers and careers agencies to provide information and advice at all stages.

## **House System**

In all departments of the School pupils are assigned to one of four Houses, namely Airlie, Aystree, Lindores and Wallace.

The House System forms the basis for many internal School competitions and a Championship Shield is awarded annually to the best house.

# **GENERAL INFORMATION**

## **Progress**

Progress reports on the attainment and diligence of all pupils are issued twice yearly, at the end of the Winter and Summer Terms, except in the case of senior pupils in Forms SIV to SVI when the second report is issued at the end of the Spring Term.

## **Parents' Meetings**

All parents are invited once each year in the Spring or Summer Terms to meet the Class Teachers and discuss a pupil's progress with them. Special Parents' Meetings for parents of pupils entering Primary I or Secondary I are held during the Summer Term.

The School is glad to co-operate with parents in any matter affecting a pupil's progress and well-being, and visits of parents to the School are welcomed to that end. Parents are asked to write to the Headteachers of the Preparatory or Junior Departments or to telephone the Rector's Secretary to arrange an appointment.

## **Admission**

Pupils are normally admitted to School after interview or test at two principal stages, namely Primary I (aged five years) and Secondary I (aged twelve years).

Pupils may be admitted to any stage at any time as and when casual vacancies arise. Waiting-lists are kept of those interested in such vacancies.

A few bursaries and scholarships are available for pupils entering the Senior Department.

## SCHOOL PROCEDURES

The attention of Parents and Pupils is specially directed to the following procedures; adherence to these is a necessary condition of attendance at School :—

**Absence.** All requests for leave of absence must be made by letter to one of the Assistant Rectors at least two days in advance. Parents are particularly requested not to ask for extensions of holidays, unless in very exceptional circumstances.

When pupils have been absent from any class, they must, on their return, bring to their Group Teacher a note of explanation from their parents or guardians.

When a pupil is absent for more than three days the Rector should be contacted by telephone or letter.

Pupils must not leave School during the day without permission from one of the Assistant Rectors, or, in an emergency, from one of the teaching staff.

**Health.** All pupils are from time to time given a medical inspection.

The Rector requests that he should be kept informed when a pupil has some long-standing health difficulty or weakness, in order that members of staff may know how to act in an emergency.

In order to minimise the spread of infection, parents are requested to refrain from sending their sons or daughters to School while still suffering from what may be considered minor ailments, e.g. colds, sore throats, etc.

When infectious disease is found to exist in a family, the Rector must be informed immediately, and the members of the family can be admitted to School only on producing a Medical Certificate.



Sometimes pupils have an accident while at School or they may become ill enough to require the School to be in contact with the parents. If both parents are normally out of the house at the same time, they are requested to arrange to have an "emergency" number or address to contact.

**Money and Valuables.** Pupils are forbidden to leave money or valuables in the cloakroom. Parents should ensure that no unnecessary money or valuables are brought to School at all. When in exceptional cases money must be brought to School, it should be deposited before 9.00 a.m. with the Deputy Rector.

**Security and Insurance.** While every care is taken of articles belonging to pupils while in the School buildings, the Directors can accept no liability in cases of loss or damage. Any question of insurance is the responsibility of parents themselves as the Board has no insurable interest.

**Interviews.** The Rector invites parents to arrange an appointment to discuss any problems affecting their children. Parents who wish consultation about their children's progress in the Preparatory or Junior Departments must make appointments with Miss Knight or Miss Grant. Parents must not contact individual teachers directly. The School telephone numbers is 29921. The postal code is DD1 1HU.

## **CODE OF DISCIPLINE**

The purpose of formalising a School Code of Discipline is not only to comply with recent legislation regarding schools but also to review and set down the current thinking in the School on the topic of discipline in the light of recent reports and developments.

### **1. Aims :**

The Aims of the Code of Discipline are two-fold —

- (a) to provide a context of good order
- (b) to ensure that conditions conducive to learning prevail throughout the School complex at all times.

These aims derive from the following premises. It is affirmed that the creation and maintenance of such an environment is necessary in order to foster adequately the personal development not only of the individual pupil but also of **all** the pupils in the School community. It is also hoped that the experience of such an environment may assist in the promotion of self-discipline in the pupils. Furthermore, it is believed that experience of a well-ordered and disciplined community during the formative period of the school years may eventually lead to the promotion of good and effective citizenship in the wider community in adult life.

The detailed structuring of these aims and the methods of implementation are set out in the following sections :—

## 2. **General Expectations :**

It is expected that pupils (and parents) will be aware of, and agree with, the following values which the School attempts to foster. Every pupil is expected to be honest and courteous, showing respect for the right and opinions of others and the property of the School. These values are the basis on which trust and open communication can grow. Without a commitment to try to live up to them, the rest of the School's programme can be compromised.

It is also expected that pupils will make themselves familiar with the code of discipline and with the Rules of the School and will understand that the Rules have to be enforced if the standards of the School community are to have any meaning.

It is hoped that the School may count on the co-operation of parents in the upholding of its standards as the School relies on the conviction that most problems of conduct will not arise as long as the parents and the School share realistically and consistently the task of establishing the right balance of freedom and responsibility for young people during their formative years.

These general expectations are embodied in the following detailed Rules.

## 3. **Rules :**

Adherence to the following Rules is a necessary condition of attendance at School —

### A **General —**

1. **Appearance.** All pupils must wear the School uniform as prescribed in the published Clothing Lists.

Pupils must give due attention to neatness and smartness of bearing. They are required to be at all times tidy in their appearance. This includes neatness and acceptability of hair style and neckwear.

The recognised School Uniform must be worn at any time when pupils are operating under the School's auspices, e.g. at all School events, Debates, Saturday games, Athletic Meetings, etc. unless pupils have been specifically instructed otherwise.

(All wearing apparel, in particular such as is ordinarily left in cloakrooms, must be clearly marked with the owner's name.)

2. **Unauthorised Absence.** No pupil is allowed to leave the School Complex during school hours or to absent

himself/herself from an individual class without the written permission of one of the Rectors or the Class Teacher, previously obtained.

3. **Homework.** Pupils are required to do satisfactorily the homework set and to have it completed on time.
4. **General Conduct.** Pupils must move about the School quietly and smartly and must refrain from throwing down litter in or about the School premises. They must also confine themselves to those parts of the School premises (or the School Playing-fields) which are indicated for their use.

Pupils must be punctual and regular in their attendance, orderly in their habits, and polite and considerate in their conduct.

5. **Property and Belongings.** Pupils must exercise the utmost care in their use of textbooks, apparatus, furnishings and buildings. Each book should show clearly the name and class of the pupil.

All cases of damage to apparatus must be reported at the earliest opportunity to the appropriate teacher: breakage of windows or damage to the School buildings or furnishings must be reported at once to the Janitors. Pupils will be required to make good any damage (unless accidental) or loss of property for which they are responsible.

6. **Obedience.** Pupils must obey all reasonable instructions promptly. They must not comply with an instruction only temporarily and then disobey the instruction when out of sight.

B The following are regarded as serious breaches of good conduct and will be dealt with severely:—

1. Lack of respect for the rights of others — the deliberate violation of the rights or dignity of others (especially physical violence or acts endangering the safety of others).
2. Vandalism — causing damage to school property.
3. Theft — theft of property, regardless of its value.
4. Cheating — cheating in examinations or school work.
5. Deceit — telling lies, prevarication, and the forgery of notes or letters.
6. Smoking — smoking and the carrying of cigarettes are forbidden: this includes the School precincts, the playing-fields, public conveyances going to and from

School, the periods of the morning break and the lunch hour wherever the pupils may be, and at all times when the pupils are wearing School Uniform or participating in School activities.

7. Pupils are strictly forbidden to possess, consume or deal in alcohol or drugs.

#### **4. Infringement of the Rules :**

Minor breaches of good conduct will be dealt with appropriately by the member of staff in charge. Most often a word in season is all that is required and the misdeed is afterwards forgotten.

More serious, or repeated infringements of the Rules will be dealt with as the severity warrants by the Class Teacher, the Principal Teacher, the Form Teacher or one of the Rectors by the imposition of an appropriate punishment.

Should the case warrant it, a letter will be sent to parents or an interview with parents may be arranged.

Normally, the escalatory response to breaches of good conduct will be: a word in season, an appropriate punishment, a letter to parents, suspension or removal from the School.

#### **5. Sanctions :**

The penalties for violation of the Rules will include:—reprimand, punishment exercise, loss of privileges, discipline time-table, detention (during lunch hour) when pupils may be required to perform useful tasks about the School (e.g. picking up litter, work within the premises, in a School office, or laboratory, etc.), suspension, expulsion.

#### **6. Conclusion :**

In addition to following the Rules listed above, pupils are expected to maintain at all times commonly accepted standards of behaviour, whether or not covered by the above Rules, and may be taken to task for failing to do so. If pupils are in doubt about what is expected of them, they should be sure to ask a member of staff, because the claim of ignorance is not an acceptable excuse for bad behaviour. Every action has a consequence, and mindless acts may be as detrimental to the School community as malicious acts.

Pupils may also appreciate that their conduct outwith school hours and School premises is no less a matter of concern to the Directors and the Rector than at other times.

The School recognises, of course, that pupils do make mistakes and hopes that they will learn from them. The School endeavours to administer penalties, when necessary, with

compassion and firmness, trying to foster the habit of self-discipline and to encourage respect for the spirit as well as the letter of the law. As we are a school the procedures are intended to be educational as well as fair and appropriate.

## **TABLE OF FEES**

### **General School and Luncheon Fees**

An Enrolment Fee of £5 is payable upon receipt of an offer of admission of a pupil into the School. This fee covers the cost of administration and is not refundable.

The following charges are advised to parents by termly fee notes :—

Classes L.I to L.VII .....	£345 per term
Forms I to VI .....	£480 per term
Luncheon .....	80p daily or reduced rate yearly fee of £136

All fees are payable termly in advance and payment is made at The Royal Bank of Scotland, 71 Reform Street, Dundee, or at the Bursar's Office.

The Term Dates are :—

1984 August 21st

1985 January 7th and April 15th

Fees may also be paid by Banker's Order. Application should be made to the Bursar not later than August 15th. For pupils at School, application is normally made in April by the Bursar's "End-of-Session" Form. One fee note covering the Session's fees will be issued in August in lieu of the three termly fee notes.

Once a term is entered upon the General School and Luncheon Fees for the whole term are due and must be paid.

Pupils, whose first time entry into the School falls during the course of a term, will be charged pro-rata upon a weekly basis. A part week will be treated as a whole week.

**THE DIRECTORS RESERVE THE RIGHT DURING THE SESSION TO ALTER THE FOREGOING REGULATIONS AND TO VARY ANY FEE.**

NO REBATE of either General School or Luncheon Fees will normally be granted in respect of the absence of a pupil on account of sickness or other cause, but in the event of prolonged absence on account of sickness or accident, the Directors may, upon application, remit a proportion of the fee.

### **Remission of General School Fees**

(a) Pupils, being the sons or daughters of full-time Ministers of Religion, will be charged two-thirds of the published fee rates.

(b) When more than three pupils from the same family attend School at any one time, every pupil after the third will be charged one-half of the published fee. This remission does not apply to pupils who are receiving remission under (a) above.

(c) Where three or more pupils from any one family attend School, the Directors may, in consultation with the Rector, and entirely at their discretion, consider application for remission up to a maximum of one-third for the third pupil, and two-thirds for any subsequent pupil.

Application forms are available from the Bursar and should be submitted annually by December 15th. Remissions are granted for one academic year only but are renewable.

(d) It should be noted that a remission of fees cannot be combined with an Assisted Place.

## **Withdrawal from School or Luncheon : Periods of Notice**

### **From School**

Notice of withdrawal of a pupil must be given **in writing** to the Rector **not later than one term in advance**. When parents know for certain earlier, that a son or daughter will be leaving, it is a great convenience to the Rector if he is informed.

If the requisite notice of withdrawal is not given, then a term's fee is due and payable.

### **From Luncheon**

In order to assist parents, lunch can now be purchased on demand by a daily cash payment of 80p or by a termly fee added to the fee note and based upon the yearly rate of £136.

As the yearly rate represents a considerable reduction upon the daily fee, no rebates are granted in respect of absences from lunch.

In the event of the withdrawal during the Session of a pupil from the yearly lunch arrangement, notice of withdrawal must be given to the Bursar **not later than 28 days prior to the end of a term**. Refunds of luncheon fees, if any, will be calculated upon the basis of 80p per lunch eaten.

### **General**

The Bursar sends to each parent in March a self-explanatory "End of Session" Form, where changes for the next Session are advised.

## **Luncheon**

Lunches for the Senior and Junior Schools are served in the School Dining Room and for the Preparatory School in a special room within its own area. Arrangements are made for those pupils who bring a packed lunch provided by their parents.

The School also operates a Cafeteria where cakes, biscuits and confectionery may be obtained during the forenoon break and light snacks during the lunch interval. There is also a Snack Bar.

## **Special Fees and Charges**

Charges may be made for stationery : for manuscripts where no suitable texts exist : for certain books of reference and for classroom materials where special circumstances apply, e.g. in the Department of Home Economics.

## **Music Fees**

**Piano** — All grades will be charged at a rate of £43.60 per 10 lessons, each of 40 minutes duration, or portion thereof.

All other instrumental fees will be charged at a basic rate of £6.54 per hour, or portion thereof.

e.g. Single pupil — 10 lessons each of ½-hour duration — £32.70

2 pupils sharing — 10 lessons each of ½-hour duration — £16.35 per pupil

For group tuition (3/4/5 pupils per group) a fixed rate will now be charged as follows :—

3 pupils sharing — a charge of £11 per term per pupil will be levied.

4 pupils or more sharing — a charge of £9 per term per pupil will be levied.

**Recorder Fees** will be charged as per instrumental fees.

**Theory** will be charged at a rate of £3.00 per lesson.

Accounts will be submitted at the beginning of each term and will be paid to the school/instructor within the month, in advance. Strict attendances will be kept and fees will be adjusted, only as appropriate by the instructor.

**Pupils Taught Singly or Two Sharing.**

When it is known that a lesson is to be missed (Examination or Holidays only), parents must notify the School or the instructor at least 48 hours beforehand. Only in such cases will fees NOT be charged.

**Teaching Groups of 3/4/5.**

It is regretted that there will be no remission of fees in case of absence. A fixed figure has been set termly and will only be adjusted where a protracted absence is unavoidable, and only then, when parents have discussed the problem with the Head of Music or the Instructor.

**For All Pupils.**

In the case of sudden illness or other emergency, the Music Department or the Instructor MUST be notified before 9.00 a.m. on the morning of the lesson. In the case of prolonged illness, remission of fees will pertain provided the instructor or the Music Department is notified 48 hours beforehand.

In the event of outstanding fees, parents will be notified that instruction will be with-held until such time as fees due are paid.

In the event of Staff absence no fees will be charged.

**Hire of School Instruments.**

Where available, instruments may be borrowed from the School when a Hire Charge of £15 per annum or £5 per term will be levied to help defray repair and maintenance costs.

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# **ANNUAL REPORT TO THE DIRECTORS OF THE HIGH SCHOOL**

## **Junior School**

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present a brief report on the life and work of the Junior School for the academic year now ending.

As we come to the close of this special session in the history of the School we are pleased to be able to look back on another chapter of sound academic achievement and enjoyable extra-curricular activities, which together have combined to provide for our pupils an enriching educational experience. That such an experience has given pleasure to the majority of pupils is obvious to all who have had the opportunity to see them at work and play.

The numbers of pupils in both departments, while reflecting the national decline in schools and youth organisations generally, still remains encouragingly high. Nevertheless, this trend has to be taken into account in the restructuring of resources, and today we bid farewell to Mrs Bartlett, who is completing her full-time commitment with us in order to develop her interests outside School. During the ten years she has been with us Mrs Bartlett has rendered loyal service to the School both by her work in the classrooms and by the keen interest she has taken in recent years in the Chess Club, whose flourishing state today is a result of her tireless efforts to promote chess among Junior School pupils. To Mrs Bartlett we offer our warm good wishes and express our thanks for all she has contributed over the years to the work of the Junior Department.

The traditional extra-curricular activities have once again harnessed the enthusiasm of pupils of all ages. In the Preparatory Department at Christmas time the younger pupils presented the annual Nativity Play which was enjoyed by young and old alike. The visit made by the LIII pupils to the Repertory Theatre to see the pantomime proved a tremendous success, and their outing to Templeton Woods where they were introduced to the Nature Trail by the Countryside Ranger gave them much pleasure. In the Junior Department the pupils enjoyed their parties at Hallowe'en and Christmas as well as their summer outings both within the city and as far as Dunkeld and Pitlochry. It is also pleasing to report that the Chess Club continues to flourish with a membership of over fifty pupils. Two teams competed in the Dundee League Championship and

three of our players were subsequently chosen to represent Dundee in inter-city matches against Perth and Aberdeen. Perhaps the most important growth activity has been promoted by the department's acquisition of the B.B.C. and Commodore computers, which have allowed all pupils to become familiar with their use. In addition, the Junior School Public Speaking Competition delighted a large and supportive audience of pupils and parents. In such varied ways the interests of our young pupils find expression so acceptably.

During this special session, however, extra items have been included in the programme. During the very successful Open Day held in the School on Saturday parents were able to visit classrooms to view the wide variety of work, exhibitions and displays, all of which bear witness to the impressive amount of imagination, skill and effort put into their work by the pupils. On the same occasion the pupils of the Preparatory Department delighted a capacity audience with a selection of musical items, while earlier in the session, in the month of March, the pupils of the Junior Department produced a concert reflecting the theme of the 150th Anniversary of the Main Building, and including as the highlight the musical "Nicholas Nickleby" — a concert which attained standards of performance the equal of which would be difficult to find in any school anywhere. Such contributions to our celebrations on the part of our young pupils undoubtedly enriched the session.

The 150th Anniversary of the Main Building may mark a milestone in the long and distinguished history of the School, but this session also marks the end of an era for the Junior Department. Today, Miss M. E. Lawson, the Head of the Junior Department, retires from the staff of the School. Over a period of thirty-one years May Lawson has made a singularly impressive contribution to the life and work of the School, which it is impossible to do justice to in this report. On an occasion such as this we can only express our deepest gratitude for virtually a life-time of service, above self, devoted to the High School of Dundee and we take this opportunity to wish her many years of health and happiness in her retirement.

Since the Main Building was opened in 1834 education has undergone many changes and particularly so in recent years. The austere classrooms and approach of last century have given way to the comfortable, bright and relaxed environment of today. More changes lie ahead of us. As a School we are ready to meet the challenges of the future, sustained in confidence by the strength of our past.

# **ANNUAL REPORT TO THE DIRECTORS OF THE HIGH SCHOOL**

## **Senior School**

High School of Dundee

29 June 1984

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Report on the life and work of the School for the academic year now ending.

As we look back today on a special session in the history of the School, during which we have commemorated the 150th anniversary of the establishment of the School on its present site, we are able to distinguish those features, traditional, special and unique, which constitute its originality. It has been a year of sound academic achievements complemented by a proliferation of activities of kaleidoscopic variety, all of which have combined to make a rich and full session.

The session began with only two changes in the staff of the School. Mr T. Guild joined the Physics Department and Mr C. Stuart came to teach Mathematics and Computer Studies. Both colleagues are now already well established in their posts. The session ends, however, with several changes, as today we bid farewell to a number of colleagues who have rendered differing but invaluable periods of service to the School. To Mrs Bartlett (Junior School), Mrs Burness (English Department) and Mrs Clark (Physical Education), we express our thanks for all they have contributed to the life and work of the School and we offer our warm good wishes for the future. With Mrs Flook who is retiring from the Music Department go our best wishes for a long and happy retirement. To Miss Lawson, who retires today from her post as Head of the Junior Department, having served the School in an exemplary fashion for over thirty-one years we would express our deepest gratitude for her invaluable contribution to the life and work of the School and wish her in her retirement health and happiness for many years to come. Nor should we forget the services rendered to the School over almost three decades by our Piping Instructor Donald McLeod, who ten days ago at the age of 89 was honoured at a retiral lunch given by the Pipes and Drums and Officers of the Cadet Contingent. The Board of Directors has seen only one change this session, as Mr Scharvona left the city on being promoted after only a few months as a Director. In his place we are pleased to welcome a former pupil of the School, Mr David Leslie, whose attainments in rugby give us so much pleasure. It is also appropriate to note at this juncture the service rendered by our Chairman, Mr

Shepherd, both as a representative of the independent schools in Scotland on the Governing Bodies Association and as the recently appointed Vice-Chairman of the Scottish Council of Independent Schools, on which body I also have the honour to represent the grant-aided schools of Scotland. In this way, as a School, we endeavour to play our part in looking after the interests of the independent sector as a whole in the evolving educational context in which we now find ourselves. Both in this and in other connections I should like to acknowledge the debt of gratitude the School owes to so many of its Directors, who so generously give of their time and their skills in the promotion of its well-being.

At the beginning of the session the appearance of the restructured School Magazine met with general acclaim and we were much encouraged to see it win a national award for one of its articles. The Magazine for this session will be published in September and will contain full and detailed accounts of the activities of the session. Accordingly, I shall confine my remarks on this occasion to a brief overview.

In its traditional elements the session has been at least the equal of its predecessors. In the academic sphere much sound work has been achieved by the combined efforts of teachers and pupils, over a wide spectrum of subjects. Examinations, both internal and external, continue to reflect great credit on the large numbers of academically able pupils in the School, who may not achieve special honours, but whose very real achievements should not be passed over on an occasion like this. To them I should like to express a special word of commendation today, because such pupils form the backbone of the tradition of the School. Furthermore, it gives us all great pleasure to learn, as they come filtering back to us, of the successes at University and College of so many of our former pupils. It is very satisfying to know that they have been able to put the schooling they received at D.H.S. to such good use. In the sphere of extra-curricular activities much of value continues to be achieved in such a wide variety of ways. Clubs and hobbies abound and flourish. The Cadets and Guides maintain their attractions and continue to offer a variety of opportunities to young people. In the sphere of sport the programme has once again been varied and intensive and has offered enjoyment and competition to so many pupils. Despite the number of teams fielded — as many as sixteen rugby teams and eleven hockey teams on a Saturday — the quality of performance is able to be maintained. In these ways the traditional work of the School goes on.

In its special elements the session has lived up to the high standards of its predecessors. In October we were delighted

to learn of the prestigious award of an Institution of Electrical Engineers Faraday Lecture Scholarship to Nigel Bartlett (Form VI last session), only the second pupil from a Scottish school to receive this award. More recently, we were pleased to learn of the Bursaries awarded by Dundee University to Mark Richardson (Form VI), by Aberdeen University to Barbara-Anne Collie and Nigel Ferguson (both Form VI) and of the award of a Tullis-Russell Scholarship to Robert Allen (Form VI). Earlier in the session Robert Allen (Form VI) and Jacqueline Reid (Form VI) were offered places at Oxford University and other senior pupils gained places for other universities and courses of comparable esteem and demand. In the Scottish Mathematical Council Mathematical Challenge Matthew Pemble (Form IV) and Graham Stewart (Form IV) were placed in the prize-winning category and Rajiv Dhir (Form IV) in the highly commended category. In the Royal Society of Chemistry Schools Competition the School team once again won first place and was awarded a special trophy. In the Aberdeen Press and Journal Debating Competition Alistair Dinnie (Form V) and Krista Johnston (Form VI) won the trophy for the best team and Krista was awarded the prize for the best speaker. In addition to those academic pursuits we are also pleased to report the increase in the number of pupils going on trips abroad. Two ski trips were organised to Les Arcs and Ovronnaz and in June a group visited Paris and the Loire Valley. At present we are pleased to host a group of some thirty pupils from our Spanish exchange school in Barcelona. In such ways the School seeks to broaden its horizons and measure up to the challenges of the outside world.

Once again this session we are pleased to give special mention to those pupils of the School who have been selected in various spheres to represent their country. Vicki Vaughan (Form IV) represents Scotland in athletics. Fiona Stevenson (Form IV) was selected for the Under 16 Squash Team at Home Internationals. Innès Aitken was chosen for the Scottish Schools Shooting Team. Robert Allen (Form VI) played for Scottish Schools at Table Tennis. Paul Barnett (Form VI) is a member of the Scottish Youth Sailing Squad. Ian Chynoweth, Neil Ritchie and Paul Stewart (all Form III) played Rugby for the Scotland Under 15 team and Kevin Burnett (Form VI) played for the Scottish Schools team. Moreover, Lindsey Gyle (Form V) was selected for a place in Operation Raleigh. To all these young people we offer our warm congratulations.

In its unique elements the session may fairly claim to be unequalled by its predecessors. To mark the 150th Anniversary of the establishment of the School in Euclid Crescent the School arranged a succession of enjoyable events. We think

of the magnificent musical productions: the Preparatory Department concert on Saturday, the Junior Department's "150th Anniversary" concert in March which included the musical "Nicholas Nickleby" and only last week the Senior School production of "The Mikado" — all of which impressed by their high standards and delighted capacity audiences. We think of the Tour to Canada, during which a group of senior rugby and hockey players visited Toronto and the surrounding area, with each team winning four out of their five matches and winning many new friends by their skills and bearing. And we must not omit to mention the tremendous parental support in fund-raising, which in itself led to activities, such as the Floral Art evening in Bonar Hall, and gave so much pleasure to so many. We think of the Open Day held in School last Saturday, which attracted such large numbers of parents and friends and which seemed to impress so many by the standards attained and the modernity of the curriculum. We think of the commemorative booklet entitled "150 Proud Years" which offers some recollections of things past and a copy of which was presented to every pupil and teacher in the School by the Board of Directors as a memento of this year. We think of the Service of Thanksgiving on Sunday evening in Dundee Parish Church when a congregation representing all ages and all sections of our community gave thanks for our heritage. We think of the launching of the Scholarship Fund on Open Day. In all these ways is the uniqueness of the session expressed.

In conclusion, as we look back today on a rich and full session, our gaze for a moment must also be allowed to drift back over the years, over the many generations of pupils who have passed through the noble columns of the portico of the Main Building to go forth to become leaders of the professions, industry and commerce in all parts of the world, and over the pages of history to that moment when in the early nineteenth century the Directors of the day, assisted with finance raised by public subscription, erected a building which would be "a distinguished ornament to the town", and thereby the School opened on its present site. Over those 150 years — proud years — which now separate us from them we would express the hope that, if they were to return to the School today, they would not find the present D.H.S. community unworthy of their glorious vision.

## **SCHOLARSHIPS AND BURSARIES**

The following Scholarships and Bursaries are offered by the School :—

1. **THE AILEEN GRAY SCHOLARSHIP** — An Open Scholarship of £300 p.a. for five or six years in the secondary department of the School is awarded by competition at the Entrance Examination among pupils whose parents or guardians require financial aid in providing their children with secondary education.
2. **LARG SCHOLARSHIPS** — Open Scholarships of up to £300 p.a. for five or six years (or less) in the secondary department are awarded for academic merit to pupils whose parents or guardians require financial aid in providing their children with secondary education.
3. **LOW AND BONAR SCHOLARSHIPS** — Open Scholarships of up to £200 p.a. for five or six years in the secondary department are awarded by competition at the Entrance Examination among scholars whose parents or guardians require financial aid in providing their children with secondary education.
4. **HIGH SCHOOL OF DUNDEE BURSARIES** — Bursaries of up to £300 p.a. awarded to pupils in the secondary department, or, in special circumstances, in the junior department, who have attained high academic standards and whose parents or guardians require financial aid in providing their children with education at the School.

All Scholarships and Bursaries are awarded in accordance with the twin criteria of academic merit and financial need.

The criterion of academic merit relates normally to the standards attained in the Entrance Examination, whilst that of financial need is determined by the salary scale fixed by the Assisted Places Scheme and relates to salaries falling just outside the Scheme. At present the range of salary likely to qualify is £11,000 - £14,000 p.a.

In those cases where it is appropriate it is considered more advantageous to submit an application for the Assisted Places Scheme. The Bursar will be pleased to advise parents on the merit of an application.

Forms of application for Scholarships and Bursaries are obtainable from the Rector at the School. The forms require a statement of current salary to be included.

Unless otherwise stated, completed application forms should be returned to the Rector at the School by 15th December, although in exceptional cases a later application may be considered.

### **Assisted Places Scheme**

The School participates in the Assisted Places Scheme and receives an allocation of funds. The School Office will provide information and application forms to parents who consider that they may qualify to participate under the Scheme. Completed forms for entry to the School should be returned to the Rector, and forms for an award under the Assisted Places Scheme should be returned to the Bursar, along with the requisite supporting certificates and documents. It should be noted that the award of an Assisted Place may affect the award of a remission, scholarship or bursary.

Full details of the Assisted Places Scheme may also be obtained from the Rector at the School, or from the Bursar, Bonar House, 17 Bell Street, Dundee.

## **AWARDS AVAILABLE TO FORMER PUPILS OF THE SCHOOL**

1. **ANDERSON SCHOLARSHIPS** — These Scholarships of £50 each are tenable at the University of St. Andrews by pupils who have attended the High School for not less than two years immediately preceding the Competition.
2. **THE MISSES BAXTER'S (OF BALGAVIES) SCHOLARSHIP** — Two Scholarships of £40 for one year at the University of Edinburgh in Science or Engineering and renewable for two or three years. Four Bursaries of £38 per annum for three years tenable in Arts, Law, Medicine or Science at Edinburgh. These Bursaries are now granted only to undergraduates of Edinburgh University with a preference given to former pupils of the High School of Dundee.
3. **THE LOWSON MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP** of £80, tenable for two years at any University in the United Kingdom, is open to Students who have attended some School in Dundee or Broughty Ferry for three years, and who have not been in attendance at a University for a longer period than one Session. 4. **EDINBURGH ANGUS CLUB — DALHOUSIE BURSARIES** — Two Bursaries of £40 per annum for three or four years are tenable in Arts at Edinburgh University. Preference is given to natives of Angus or to candidates who have been educated at a School or Schools in the County for not less than five years. ### 5. **DUNDEE EDUCATIONAL TRUST UNIVERSITIES BURSARIES**

1. **Residential Scholarship** — One Residential Scholarship tenable for 3 or 4 years or longer at the University of St. Andrews or the University of Dundee, or under certain circumstances at any University in the United Kingdom, of an annual value not exceeding £200, is awarded by competition among inhabitants of Dundee (the area of Dundee District Council), in attendance at a Secondary School. The student who is awarded a scholarship will reside in a Residential Hall of the University.
2. **University Bursaries** — Bursaries each tenable for 3 or 4 years or longer at any University in the United Kingdom are awarded among inhabitants of Dundee (the area of Dundee District Council) who have attended any school where secondary education is provided. Bursaries are also awarded by competition or otherwise to inhabitants of Dundee already in attendance at a University.

Bursaries are also awarded under similar circumstances at any Central Institution or College of Education.
