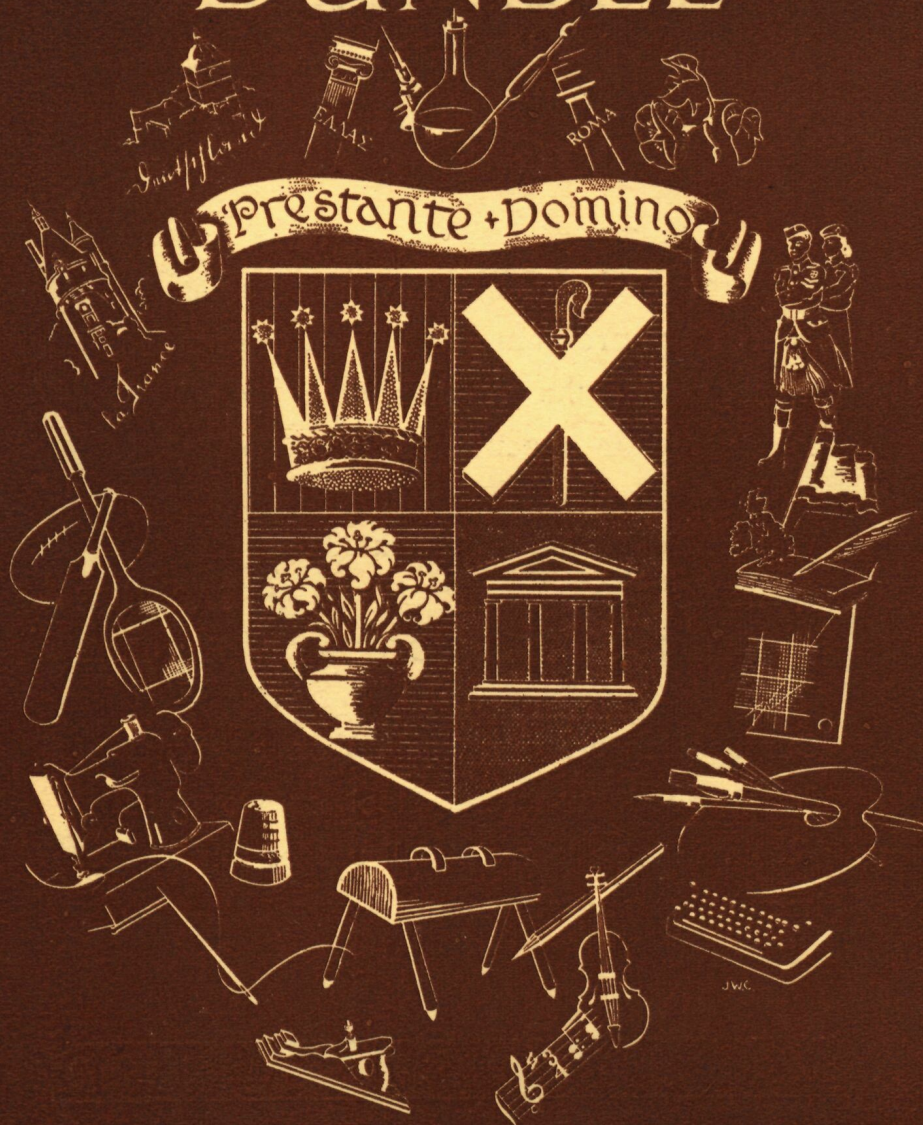

Editorial

Summer is almost with us now—we are looking at the calendar and not at the weather—and its arrival is heralded not only by signs of summer sport, but also by a general lightening of the atmosphere in the school as the last of the inspectors depart and the school looks forward to the holidays, without the spectre of exams in front to haunt the lazy or wayward scholar. But to us the coming of summer has also brought the dismaying news that it is our lot to write the Editorial.

At first sight the prospect did not seem too dismal, for it was evident to us that all we had to do was to read through past Editorials and rewrite what our predecessors had written in a different way. We soon found, however, that it was not to be so easy as that, for Editors in the past had obviously done what we were doing and written what we were going to write. So, with a sigh of regret for the brilliant editorial that might have been, we set out to record some of the recent happenings in the school.

Probably the most obvious improvement in the school is the extension of the House System to the girls. We think that there can be little doubt that the experiment, which was received with great enthusiasm, has been very successful. We congratulate Airlie on being the leading house, and all the houses on their fine sense of sportsmanship.

In spite of the bad weather we have had since Christmas, sports enthusiasts in the school have not let their spirits be seriously damped. Both the Sports and the Gala were well attended and they aroused great interest throughout the school among both competitors and non-competitors—doubtless owing to the system of awarding points to the winners for their house.

It is now quite a common occurrence for parties from the school to go to the Rep., and we can even remember parties getting very wet going to see "Hamlet" at the pictures and very dirty going round the gas-works, but it must be a very long time since the school as a whole went on board ship. This remarkable happening took place one Wednesday in May, when a large party from the school was conveyed by bus to the King George V. Wharf to see the exhibition on board the festival ship, Campania. The ship, as she lay in her berth at the wharf, was an impressive sight. Opinions differed, however, about the exhibition on board, although we fancy that the pupils at any rate were agreed that it was worth it, if only for the morning off school and the ices they bought — indeed some adventurous spirits seemed to think it was worth a longer stay, but they were, to their dismay, finally rounded up and forced to go back to school with the main party.

One of the faults of the pupils of this school is that they are apt to be so engrossed in their own petty affairs that they pay little attention to the happenings of the outside world. It is a defect which the English Department is always trying to remedy, but we feel that this term it has surpassed itself, and the lectures delivered on recent events in Korea and Persia were worthy of the House of Commons at the very least.

We congratulate all those who have been successful in school activities during the year, whether on the scholastic side or in sport. To Miss Wright, who is going to London, and to all pupils who are leaving we extend our best wishes for the future and we wish everybody a happy holiday.

OBITUARY

We regret to record the deaths of the following, to whose relatives we extend our deepest sympathy:—

Mr J. G. B. Meiklejohn, M.A., died at Dundee Royal Infirmary on 19th January, 1951. **Mr Meiklejohn** taught in the High School from 1898, and was head of the mathematics department when he retired in 1937. He was a Director of the school from 1942 till November, 1950.

Rev. J. H. Duncan, M.A., B.Phil., D.D., our School Chaplain, died suddenly on 1st February, 1951. **Dr Duncan** was prominently identified with the affairs of many public bodies and was Moderator of Dundee Presbytery. He was recently appointed a chaplain to the King in Scotland. "His reality and faithfulness gave him the qualities of a great man."

Dr Sydney Watson Smith, once a popular doctor in Dundee, who became President of the British Medical Association, has died at Bournemouth. Seventh son of the late Colonel W. Smith, he was educated at the High School and later studied at University College, Dundee, and at Edinburgh and London Universities. **Dr Smith** held the M.D. degree of Edinburgh, and had the un-

usual twin distinction of F.R.C.P. of Edinburgh and London. He was President of the B.M.A. in 1934-35. He wrote much for medical publications and also edited the "Book of Bournemouth."

Mr F. Routledge Bell (58), died suddenly on 7th Feb., 1951. A native of Inverness, Mr Bell came to Dundee when he was 18. In 1931 he obtained the degree of L.R.A.M. In 1932 he was appointed teacher of violin to Dundee Education Committee. The same year he and his pupils gave a recital for charity which became an annual event. The Dundee School Children's Holiday Fund has benefited from the concert every year since 1937. Mr Bell became a teacher of music to the High School in 1942.

Mr James Patterson Fleming, an elder of Ogilvie Church, and for twenty years chairman of Midmill Sunday School, died early this year. He was president of the Boys' and Girls' Religious Association for many years. Mr Fleming retired last year from the firm of Robertson, Ireland & Co., where he had served for thirty-eight years. He was closely identified with D.H.S.F.P. Cricket Club, and played for them in his younger days.

Mr Ivan Phillipowski (55), concert pianist, died in London in February, 1951. Born in Calcutta, he toured India as an infant prodigy. He gave recitals in Dundee and London and toured Europe, America and Canada. At the age of eighteen he taught music in the High School.

Mr Thomas L. Miller, the oldest member of the jute trade in Dundee, died on 1st March, 1951, in his 94th year. A native of the city, Mr Miller was educated at the High School and later entered the office of his father's factory in Ann Street. Under his guidance the firm was extended by the purchase of Nelson Street Factory and of Hill-side Works. During the first world war and the years after it Mr Miller was recognised throughout the city and district for his philanthropic work. His greatest work for charity was on behalf of the Lord Roberts Memorial Workshops, when as treasurer (1919-20) he raised £17,000. All his activities—whether on the jute market or in the many other bodies with which he was identified—were marked by keen business ability.

Mr W. B. Dickie (70), died at his home, Farington, Dundee, on 25th March, 1951. Son of the late Mr W. B. Dickie, he was educated at the High School and served his apprenticeship as a solicitor with Messrs Macpherson & Mackay, W.S., Edinburgh. He had a wide legal knowledge, and this, coupled with his unfailing good humour, won the complete confidence of his clients and established himself and his colleagues firmly with the public. Apart from law, he had an interest in farming, and was a sportsman—keen on shooting, fishing and golf.

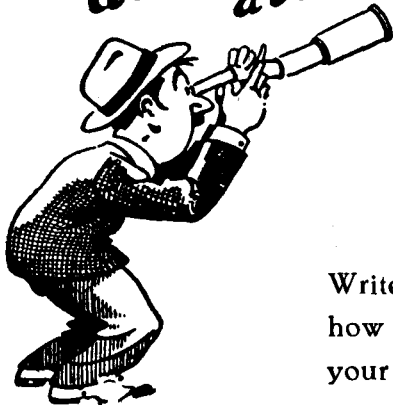
Dr Frank E. Anderson (51) died at his home, Trinity House, Bungay, Suffolk, on 13th April, 1951. Dr Anderson was educated at the High School and graduated at University College, Dundee. His first appointment was on the staff of Gordon College, Khartoum. After over ten years there, he returned to this country and set up in partnership in Bungay. During the last war Dr Anderson was taken prisoner at the fall of Singapore. The illness leading to his death was the result of his treatment in Japanese hands.

Mr William Alfred Webb, Harrowby, Invergowrie, former principal teacher of modern languages at the High School, died suddenly on 19th April, 1951. A graduate of Durham University, Mr Webb was on the teaching staff of the school for thirty-three years, and retired through ill-health in 1940. In the first world war he was awarded the Military Cross while a lieutenant in the Machine Gun Corps. Keenly interested in athletics, he was for several years secretary of the Athletic Union and did valuable work in the organisation of the recreation scheme.

Mr J. J. Ferguson, M.A., has died in California. He was for some time Head of King's College, Hong-Kong.

Mr Stephen C. Muir (42) died in Worcester Royal Infirmary on 15th May, 1951. Mr Muir entered the service of the Caledonian Insurance Company in 1925, and was subsequently inspector in charge of Perth sub-office. Since 1938 he had been an inspector in the Hereford branch of the company. He was an Associate of the Chartered Insurance Institute.

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Professor Alexander McKenzie (81), Emeritus Professor of Chemistry of University College, Dundee, died at his home, 5 Invermark Terrace, Barnhill, on 12th June. Son of Mr Peter McKenzie, former schoolmaster at Tealing, Professor McKenzie was a distinguished pupil of the High School and had a conspicuous record as a student of St Andrews University, where he graduated M.A., B.Sc. in 1885. He graduated Ph.D. in Germany and later took the D.Sc. degree of St Andrews University. He became a Fellow of the Royal Society in 1916, and received the honorary LL.D. degree of St Andrews University in 1939. Professor McKenzie was very popular with his students, who will remember him as a very kind and helpful friend. Members of staff extend their deepest sympathy to Mrs McKenzie and Duncan.

THE REV. J. H. DUNCAN, D.D.

It is difficult to estimate how much we have lost by the sudden and untimely death of Dr Duncan. Educated at Forfar Academy and St Andrews University, where, after a brilliant career, he graduated with First Class Honours in Philosophy, he devoted his great gifts to the ministry of the Church of Scotland. He held charges at Glencarse and Kilmarnock before coming to Dundee Parish Church (St Mary's) in 1937. As Parish Minister he became ex officio a Director of the School and honorary chaplain, while in addition Mrs Duncan and the two boys are distinguished former pupils. No wonder he looked on us with friendly eyes.

Nothing was too much trouble for Dr Duncan. Periodic services at School gradually developed into services for pupils, parents and friends at St Mary's, and the yearly carol service in particular has become a feature of the School life. Both at St Mary's and in School his regular attendance at functions induced a spirit of reverence and worship which must remain a lasting influence on the pupils. He had an unerring moral insight, a firm grasp of what was essential and what was merely incidental, tireless energy, and a kind heart. It was always easy to work with Dr Duncan, he was so fair, so helpful, so friendly, so eager to give of his best, and so convinced that others were trying as well as he himself. A strong and

ennobling influence has been removed from our midst, and Dundee as a whole and the School in particular have suffered a heavy loss. To his wife and sons we extend our deepest sympathy and assure them that, along with them, we will remember him.

J. G. B. MEIKLEJOHN, M.A.

We are all much the poorer by the death of Mr Meiklejohn, whose association with Dundee High School extended continuously for more than fifty years. He became an Assistant Master in the Mathematical Department in 1898, was appointed Headmaster in 1902, and remained in that post until his retirement in 1937. Very soon afterwards he was elected a member of the Board of Directors, and served until his resignation in autumn last year.

Mr Meiklejohn, the twelfth of a family of thirteen, was born on a farm near Thurso. He went to school at the Miller Institution, walking the three and a half miles each way every day. He was probably the first Pupil Teacher in that school and the first to go from there to a Training College. In 1892 he gained two very valuable bursaries—a First Class Queen's Scholarship (£62 10s) and the Rhind Bursary (£80), which must have made him more than self-supporting during his University career.

At the University of Edinburgh his first love was the Classics, and he was a prize-winner in both Latin and Greek. But in his second year he fell under the spell of Professor Chrystal, was medallist in all Chrystal's classes, and eventually graduated with first-class honours in Mathematics, gaining the Newton Scholarship.

A quotation from one of his fellow-graduates may best show the quality of the man. "A tall and rather handsome student, reserved but courteous in manner—he was never stand-offish. A man of honour, on whom one could instinctively rely. I have heard Dr Ogilvie, headmaster of Watson's College, speak very highly of his services in an interim capacity in that school, and express the wish that he could have served him on a permanent footing—apparently Dundee intervened!" Gifts and training alike marked him for a leading place in his profession, and he devoted them gladly to the school. He was a great teacher, and over the years his interest and energy never flagged. The long

list of successes which his pupils gained at the Universities and in the professions marks his greatness, but equally so does the inconspicuous "pass" which year by year was gained by boy and girl with scant ability in Mathematics.

Mr Meiklejohn was no arid mathematician. He was a great walker, never happier than when trudging over his native hills; a deft and interested gardener; a keen swimmer, who did much for the sport in school, and visited the Baths regularly until a week or two before his death. During his retirement, his knowledge and judgment in educational matters were of the utmost value to the Board; while in the war years he gave assistance to the Technical College and was for long an examiner on the panel of the Scottish Education Department. He was fortunate in his home life, but was deeply affected by the death of his wife in 1936; his family were generously endowed with gifts similar to his own, and he was proud of their achievements. We offer them our deep sympathy in their loss, in the full knowledge that we are joined by that vast company who, having known their father's power and strength and understanding, remember him with admiration and affection.

MR MEIKLEJOHN

(By One of his Former Pupils)

"And so Mike is away!" That sad and affectionate exclamation must have escaped from the lips of hundreds of F.P.'s when the announcement of his death appeared. Every one who has been at D.H.S. for the last half-century (except perhaps a few of the youngest present pupils) has had some contact with Mike, for after his retirement he became an active Governor, and each one knows that his nickname was an inevitable, awful, but reverent part of his fame.

Mr Meiklejohn was a truly great teacher—not merely effective—great. He loomed gigantic in the School. His very pleasantries soon became legends. Junior classes might wait trembling outside his door (all classes had to wait: he couldn't bear to part with the one he had, and so all were late), but they were righteously conscious that they were well prepared. Other teachers' homework might have been crowded out or scamped,

but not Mike's; it was always done. Senior classes, even the Olympian Tenth (in my day before reason gave place to convention), were sure as they waited outside, muttering trig. formulae out of little notebooks, that they were in for a period of the most intense exertion ever known to boys.

Long before most boys left the School they had come to regard Mike with a kind of awed idolatry. If he was "a terror," he was a genial, human terror. Very few, I think, disliked him. His gruff, rolling chuckle at a howler, the unmatched depth of his sunburn after summer holidays, his enthusiasm for swimming (carried on till shortly before his death), the absence of rancour from his nature, these proved he was no mere pedagogue. F.P.'s found him full of interest in their careers, and ever ready to welcome them, either at school (if he was not teaching!) or rather at his house at Newport, to which he migrated from West Park when I was still a little boy.

Happy the School which, even once in a while has a Mr Meiklejohn on its staff. Fortunate the boy or girl who comes under an influence such as Mike's during impressionable years.

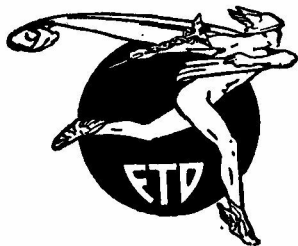
(By a Former Colleague)

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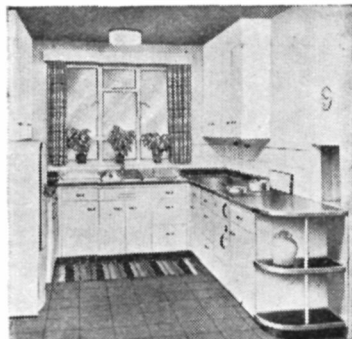
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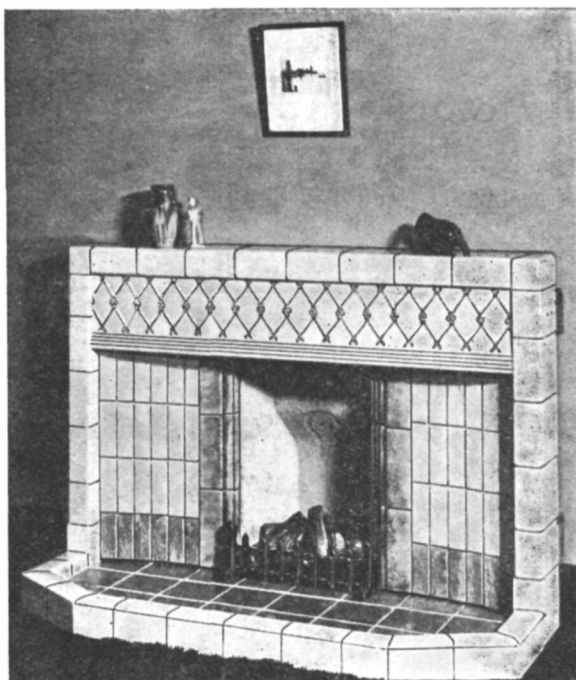
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W. A. WEBB, M.C., M.A., M.Litt.

Many of the older former pupils of the School will have read with regret of the death in April of this year of Mr W. A. Webb, formerly head of the Modern Languages Department.

An M.A., M.Litt. of Durham University, Mr Webb came to the High School as second master in his department early in 1908 and was appointed head in 1921, a position he filled until ill-health enforced his premature retiral in the uncertain days of the spring of 1940. This period of more than thirty-two years' service was broken during the First World War, when Mr Webb was serving with the Army in France. Receiving his commission in the Highland Light Infantry, he transferred at his own request to the Machine Gun Corps, in which he was awarded the Military Cross.

It is difficult for one who knew Mr Webb only during the closing years of his professional life to deal adequately with his long career in School. I knew him primarily as an unassuming, sympathetic, helpful Head, ready with his advice on any point on which

he was consulted, yet never arbitrarily imposing his own opinions, unwilling to interfere in the work of his assistants, yet obtaining their fullest co-operation and effort by his very trust in them. One could not fail to be struck by his energy of body and mind, an energy which found its expression in an intense love of the open-air and all outdoor sports and recreations and which led him to play a very prominent part in the organisation of the athletic activities of the High School; an energy which revealed itself again in the strength and independence of his views on men and affairs, in his impatience with the slightest suggestion of pretence or hypocrisy, and in the honesty and force with which he stated his convictions.

We saw little of Mr Webb in School during the years of his retirement. We missed his genial presence, his rare humour and gift of anecdote, his shrewd and original comments on the affairs of the day. With his passing has gone one whom his pupils will remember with affection for his inspiration and guidance and who was truly their friend.

We extend our deepest sympathy to Mrs Webb and family.

Letter from India—1945

Part III. (Conclusion)

(New Delhi) 7th Jan. This is supposed to be the world's hottest capital city, and yet it can be cold too! Here we are with a temperature of only 40° in the mornings. The Indians are going about wrapped in blankets and we are even working in our greatcoats in the palace which is our office. They say that Simla has ten feet of snow just now, and that is far more than usual there—it is 8,000 feet up into the hills and we seem to be getting the cold winds from there meantime.

20th Jan. — Much milder again. Funny thing, but one can't buy bicycle lamp batteries here, and I'm still using the one I brought out from home. If you don't have a light, nobody seems to worry here! I have discovered that limes, which are always available here, are ideal for making Russian tea, which I like as it saves one from using the local milk which is pretty watery stuff, and is boiled—I hope, anyway—before we see it. I bought a pair of nut-crackers, nice looking things from Kashmir, with walnutwood handles, but they broke on the first almond shell I tried to crack!

7th Feb. — All our letters are now to go free by air mail, so that will save us all a lot

of money and it should mean more letters home (and more work for those of us who do censoring duty at times).

11th Feb. — Visited a Christian School in Old Delhi to-day, and found it very interesting; also was in the Viceroy's garden in the afternoon—it was open on behalf of some local charity. It must be one of the finest gardens in India; you should have seen the fine roses! The fountains also add greatly to the beauty of the scene.

17th Feb. — There was a local rugby match here to-day, between army teams, and, as the visiting team were paratroops, they all parachuted down one after the other from a huge transport plane; one of them overshot the stadium and landed on a roof, so that might have been the reason why the home team won. We saw the whole landing from our office window.

25th Feb. — Its warming up again now, so we'll soon be wearing our khaki drill again. The moonlight seems to be very brilliant at this season here. C. has four of his paintings in a local Art Exhibition in the Town Hall; it really is a fine show, quite as good as many I've seen at home.

7th Mar. — C. and I are now at Lahore on leave. We are at a hostel which is the town house of the ruling Prince of Chamba State and it is being run like a first class hotel. There seem to be more trees and vegetation here than in Delhi; possibly that is because there is a lot of artificial irrigation in the Punjab district. They even have a zoo here! You should see us in our civvies; Indian-made jackets and cloth hats! My colour scheme is brown, but C.'s jacket is blue, and he wears a Gordon tartan tie, so goodness knows what kind of a pair we look. I'm sure we created a sensation at the local Gymkhana Club when we looked in there.

14th Mar. — To-day we went by train to Amritsar, where we visited the famous Golden Temple of the Sikhs. With a guide, we were able to go all over the buildings and we also saw the place where they feed poor people, or, for that matter, any one who wants a meal; we were even in their bake-house. Apparently, very few Europeans bother to go there, but we found it well worth while.

28th Mar. — The temperature has gone up to 100° again, a bit sooner than usual. We are all taking lots of salt to avoid "heat exhaustion." The Mess cinema shows are now held out of doors.

11th Apr. — Last Sunday I saw a wonderful performance, by service amateurs, of "A Midsummer Night's Dream," out of doors, after dark in a wonderful setting in a park, beside an old Moslem tomb. The memory of it will remain with us all for years.

15th Apr. — C. fancied he would like an aquarium, just as he had at home, so he bought a large glass bowl, and we went out after dark to see if we could catch a few fish in the ornamental ponds, in Princes Park, nearby. We had a torch and a net made from the crook of a walking stick and an old sock! Eventually, we caught a few tiny fish and one tadpole.

16th Apr. — Our bearer was most interested in the "fishy" collection. Curiously enough, he had never seen, or even heard of, tadpoles before. I doubt if he believed us when we told him they would grow into frogs. We didn't know the Urdu word for a frog, and we had to explain it by jumping around like frogs—if anyone had seen us we would

have been certified as insane, I fear. Then, he gave the fish about a slice of bread to eat and we had to give them a fresh lot of water—never a dull moment!

8th May — On hot-weather leave at Simla. I got the good news about the end of the war in Europe when I stopped for breakfast at a restaurant half-way up the railway to Simla. The menu included tiny German type sausages to mark the occasion! I'm staying at a house in the Vice-regal estate and sleeping in a room in the Viceroy's Lodge. They are floodlighting the Lodge tonight to celebrate. There are to be fireworks tomorrow.

12th May — We have violent thunderstorms every night here, but it is glorious weather during the day. There are a lot of wild monkeys about, some small and brown and some large grey ones. They make a lot of noise when they chase one another over the iron roofs of the smaller houses and out-houses. It's a great place for flowers of all kinds. One of our fellow-guests is Freya Stark, the well-known explorer and writer about the Middle East.

27th May — I was in the broadcasting studio at "All India Radio" last night as a member of the audience. I was invited there by Captain Ross Parker, the song writer, who was the compère for the occasion. The building was air-conditioned to 65° and the outside temperature was 110°.

10th June — Our bearer is away home to the North West Frontier to get married; he is about 17, I think! We paid his fare one way in the hope that he will return to us. The substitute he produced does not understand much English, but is a very willing type.

17th June — My promotion came through to-day, and the thermometer celebrated by touching 115.8°, a record so far this year.

30th June — The weather has broken now and we are all suffering from "prickly heat," which is no joke, I assure you. Fancy meeting one's neighbour in a New Delhi street, but that happened to me to-day—I ran into W. who is on a course here after being all through the Burma Campaign; and he is pleased to see civilization again. And yet, he never had "prickly heat" at all until he came here.

7th July — I'm Duty Officer tonight, and, do you know, I sleep in one of the rooms of the one-time zenana (or harem) of the Palace? A somewhat unusual experience! Two of us have moved out of the Mess in order to stay as paying guests at a private house, which is in a cooler area of the town; at least it gets more of the breeze, and it is very comfortable there too. I found that the crickets have eaten away one side of a suitcase; it was under my bed, and the sweeper must never have moved it to clean underneath.

4th Aug. — We had grilled pigeon for dinner—they keep a "Doocote" in the garden, against an emergency such as arose to-day, a butcher's strike; so it reminds one of the onetime traditional Fife Laird, referred to by Sir Walter Scott, who had "a pickle land, a doocote and a lawplea."

7th Aug. — I'm sending home in the next parcel a little Mule Bell. They wear them as they come all the way over the mountains from Tibet, and they have the most curious musical notes.

14th Aug. — I'll soon be on my way home for release now! I'm trying to get a few days in the Hills before I leave for Bombay and Home.

17th Aug. — Well, V-J day has come and I'm taking advantage of a short official holiday by visiting Naini Tal, in the hills. It was a journey of 18 hours by train and road. Although it is wet here yet—it is really too early in the season—it is a welcome change, and the scenery is really wonderful. The small town is built around a lake some 7,000 or 8,000 feet above sea level. The local flowers are simply magnificent too. I'm very glad I have seen this before I leave India's shores for good.

21st Aug. — I went up to get a distant view of the Himalayas to-day, going up in a "Dandy," which is a sort of box with four poles, each of which is carried by a coolie on his shoulder. I can't say I like the idea of being carried this way, but one must try (almost) anything once!

26th Aug. — I leave New Delhi for Bombay tomorrow on the Frontier Mail train—26 hours journey and then to wait for a ship . . . I wonder how long!

(Bombay) 9th Sept.—Still awaiting transport, but I'm filling in time exploring the town. They are drawing lots for berths in each ship now. Have been at the Cricket Club and saw a match; the food there is excellent also (which is more than one can say of the Mess which is in a suburb called Worli, on the seafront). I have hired a bicycle and am certainly seeing the district thoroughly.

15th Sept. — Met an old friend from Delhi to-day, Eric Roberts of the B.B.C. Scottish Orchestra.

20th Sept.—Was lucky in the draw to-day, for a berth on the next ship—I don't care even if it is a Chinese Junk, as long as it sails in the right direction. Visited Wilson College here to-day. It is run by the Church of Scotland and I was very well entertained by Principal Kellock.

22nd Sept. — We sail on the 24th, so then it will be " . . . a troopship leaving Bombay . . ."

(In the Gulf of Suez) 2nd Oct. — This letter will be landed at Suez and sent by air, so it will be the last of a long series from overseas. We are on the P. & O. "Mooltan," an oldish but very comfortable ship. Lots of old friends on board, too. I'll be home before my birthday this month.

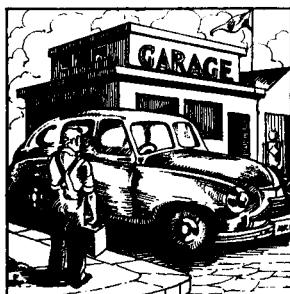

My next play was to be performed in Liverpool, and this was to be a great occasion for me, as Mr Whatmore had written the play and had recommended me for the part. Unfortunately, I was not permitted to take the part as, by Scottish law, a child under thirteen years of age may only perform on six occasions in a period of six months, and, as I had already used up my quota, I was refused permission. This was my first great disap-

pointment, which was followed by two more. I was cast in "The Three Musketeers," but, alas! my waiting period of six months had not expired and I could not take the part. Then, after we had rehearsed for two weeks in the play, "Count Your Blessings," during the dress rehearsal our leading lady was recalled to London as her husband was dangerously ill and the play was postponed. A few months before Christmas, 1950, I played the part of "Raymond" in the play, "Queen Elizabeth Slept Here," in which I was the mischievous nephew. This play was a great success, and we played to packed houses every evening. As the final curtain came down each night, I was thrown into a dustbin.

I have also played the part of "Pip" as a young lad in another of Charles Dickens' classics, "Great Expectations."

I had also been asked to act in London this year, from January till October, but as Mr Whatmore and my parents did not want my education to be split up for so long a period I had this cancelled.

I consider myself very fortunate in being asked to act at the Dundee Repertory Theatre, as Mr Whatmore is an excellent producer and brings to Dundee the very best of actors and actresses. I have gained, at a very early age, a great deal of valuable experience and tuition, for which I am indebted to Mr Whatmore.

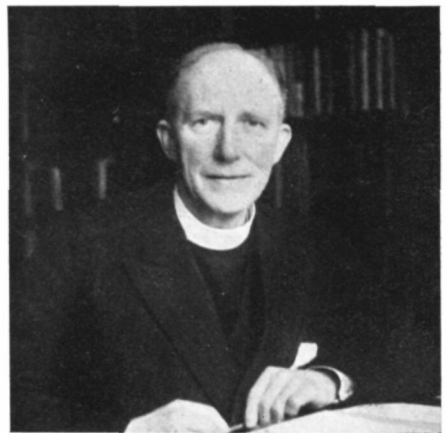

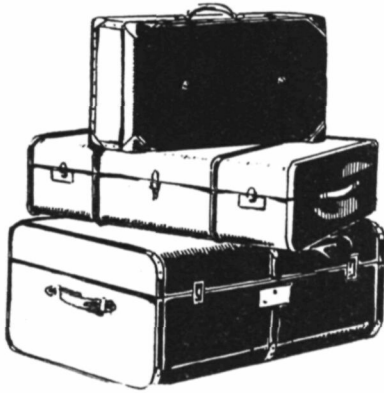

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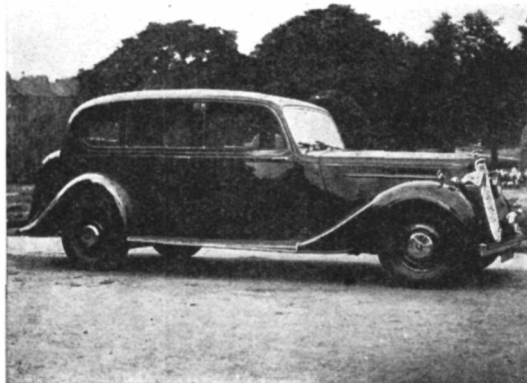
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A VILLAGE SHOW

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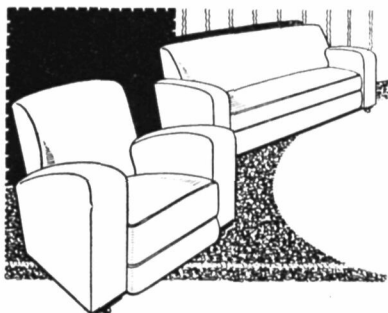
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Reports

Boys' Literary Society

Mr Hooper was complimented by the chairman for the fine arrangement of his speech on the Scottish Repertory Theatre.

A mixed debate with the motion, "That Chivalry is dying," provided the entertainment for the evening of November 17. The Boys' Society, taking the matter very seriously, called upon Assistant-Secretary, Mr Weatherhead, and Secretary, Mr Taylor, to oppose the motion. Another mixed debate held later in the season had as its motion, "That the privileges of women have increased, are increasing, and ought to be diminished." Mr Duncan and Mr Lyon, proposing the motion, were opposed by Miss Montgomerie and Miss Neilson. Many sarcastic comments were countered in an equally scathing manner, and members took part in heated discussions. The motion was defeated by 50 votes.

The Society is again indebted to outside speakers for excellent lectures. Mr Ford gave advice accrued from long experience in his talk on Rugby, while Mr Boyd, curator of the museum, gave an interesting lecture on work "behind the scenes" at the museum and art galleries. Of the staff, Mr Marshall gave a lecture on the "Future of Atoms," tempering the gravity of his subject with his typical witty sallies.

A mixed Hat Night, which had not been held for many years, was received with enthusiasm by both Societies. After shyness had been conquered, members voiced their opinions in spirited fashion, and many interesting debates ensued.

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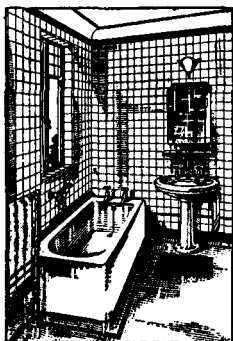
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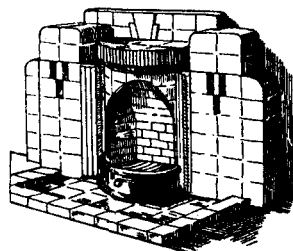
