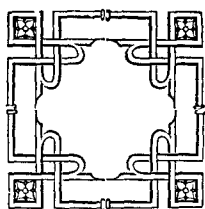

THE HIGH SCHOOL OF DUNDEE consists of two Schools—a Boys' School and a Girls' School—and provides a liberal education both for boys and for girls. It accordingly supplies instruction in all the usual English branches, and also in Classics, Modern Languages, Mathematics, Science, Commerce, Music, and Drawing.

**ACCOMMODATION, SUPERVISION,
AND SUBJECTS OF STUDY.**

G I R L S ' S C H O O L.

In the Girls' School the Rector has associated with him in the supervision of the School a highly educated and experienced Lady Superintendent, whose duty it is to exercise a general superintendence over the girls, to visit their class-rooms, to regulate their conduct and manners, and to advise and aid them in the preparation of their lessons.

In addition to the usual class-room accommodation, which is of a very complete and thoroughly modern character, the Girls' School contains a large assembly hall, a science lecture room, and a suite of eight music rooms. Three of the class-rooms have been specially equipped for the teaching of drawing, painting, and enamelling, and two for the teaching of sewing. In the furnishing of the school every provision has been made for securing the health and comfort of the girls. The cloak rooms and lavatories have been fitted with the most modern improvements, and a covered play-shed has been provided where the girls may have exercise in inclement weather. The girls have the use of part of the boys' playground for out-door exercise at certain intervals and under suitable regulations.

The subjects of study in the Girls' School include English, Latin, Greek, French, German, Mathematics, Science, Handwriting, Book-keeping, Phonography, Commercial Correspondence, Needlework, Dressmaking, Cookery, Singing, Drawing, Painting, Gymnastics, and Calisthenics. The classes for Pianoforte Instruction, Violin, Cookery, and Dancing are voluntary, and the hours for these are so arranged as not to interfere with the regular work of the pupils. Pupils in the Secondary Department only and special pupils may have instruction in Cookery. Swimming is taught throughout the School Session.

BOYS' SCHOOL.

The pupils in the Boys' School are under the immediate supervision of the Rector.

The Boys' School contains, in addition to the usual class-room accommodation, a commodious and well-equipped chemical laboratory, an excellent physical laboratory, constructed and fitted up to meet the most modern requirements, a spacious workshop, and a gymnasium. Suitable verandahs, cloak rooms, lavatories, &c., are provided for the comfort and convenience of the pupils. In the gymnasium, which is equipped with the most approved apparatus, the girls as well as the boys have Drill, Calisthenics, and Gymnastics under qualified instructors. A Recreation Ground, five acres in extent and within easy access, has been provided at a cost of nearly £3,000 for Football, Cricket, Hockey, Lawn Tennis, and other outdoor games and pastimes, which are conducted under careful supervision. The Recreation Ground is open to girls as well as boys.

The subjects of study in the Boys' School include English, Latin, Greek, French, German, Mathematics, Science, Handwriting, Book-keeping, Phonography, Commercial Correspondence, Drawing, Gymnastics, and Military Drill. The pupils may also avail themselves of the voluntary classes for Pianoforte Instruction, Violin, and Dancing. Swimming is taught throughout the School Session.

ORGANIZATION.

Curricula. Each School is divided into two grades, these two grades being each subdivided into two Departments, as follows:—

I.—LOWER SCHOOL—

- { (a) **Preparatory Department**, including Classes I.A., I.B., I.C., and II.
- { (b) **Junior Department**, including Classes III. and IV.

II.—UPPER SCHOOL—

- { (a) **Intermediate Department**, including Classes V. to VII.
- { (b) **Secondary Department**, including Classes VIII. to X.

THE PREPARATORY SCHOOL—for pupils from 5 to 10 years of age—where the ordinary English branches are taught. Parents are particularly requested to consider the advantages to be derived by sending their children to the Preparatory Department of the High School. Pupils who have been trained in the Preparatory School enter the Junior School at the same stage of advancement, and are prepared to take full advantage of the course of study in the First Year of the Junior School. The teaching is more effective and the progress of the pupils more certain when the attention of the Teacher is not distracted by pupils who enter the Junior School without having received a suitable elementary education.

THE JUNIOR SCHOOL—for pupils from 10 to 12 years of age—in which all the subjects of the Preparatory School are continued, and French added.

THE UPPER SCHOOL—for pupils from 12 years of age upwards—comprising Classes V. to X. In the Fifth Class Latin, Mathematics, and Science are added to the Curriculum. From the Sixth Class upwards the school has three parallel courses of instruction—the CLASSICAL, the MODERN WITH LATIN, and the TECHNICAL (or MODERN). *Parents should be careful at this stage to notify to the Rector which of these Courses they wish their children to enter.* In the Eighth Class two further curricula are added, viz., the COMMERCIAL, and the DOMESTIC COURSE (for Girls). The CLASSICAL, and the MODERN WITH LATIN, Courses are specially intended for those who mean to go forward to the Universities. The former embraces Latin, Greek, and a Modern Language; the latter, Latin and French, or German. The COMMERCIAL and the TECHNICAL Courses are designed specially for those who have in view a business career, though the latter Course also prepares pupils who mean to go forward to the Universities with a view to Science or Engineering Degrees. In the Science Department of the School which is provided with large and well-equipped Chemical and Physical Laboratories and a spacious Workshop, there is imparted a thorough and progressive course of instruction in the elements of Science, forming a suitable preliminary training for pupils who mean to pursue the study of Science or Medicine at the Universities, or those who intend to become manufacturers, mechanical or electrical engineers, architects, builders, or agriculturists.

Classification of Schools : Primary, Intermediate, and Secondary Schools.

The division of the School into the different grades and departments above-mentioned, agrees closely with the classification of Schools now adopted by the Education Department, which is as follows:—Schools are of three kinds—Primary, Intermediate, and Secondary. A School or department of a School giving an education based entirely upon English to pupils who are, as a rule, below the age of 14, is called a Primary School. A School providing at least a three years' course of Secondary Education—including, as a rule, instruction in a language or languages other than English—to pupils who have passed the Qualifying Examination (see below, paragraph headed "Government Examinations and Certificates") is called an Intermediate School. A School providing at least a five years' course in Secondary Education beyond the stage of the Qualifying Examination is called a Secondary School. According to this classification the Primary Department of the High School includes Classes I. to IV., the Intermediate Department Classes V. to VII., and the Secondary Department Classes VIII. to X. The Intermediate and Secondary Departments of a School are sometimes classed together as the Higher Department of the School, and the education given in the Higher Department is spoken of as Higher Education. The classification of Schools and departments of Schools into Primary, Intermediate, and Secondary is important, as it forms the basis of the Education Department's arrangements and regulations with regard to Examinations, Grants, Training of Teachers, and their educational policy generally.

Exemptions from the Prescribed Courses. The Directors are of opinion that a systematic and complete course of study should be taken by all pupils if they are to receive

a well-balanced, thorough, and liberal training. Accordingly a fixed minimum fee, which covers all the ordinary subjects of instruction prescribed for the year in each of the different courses, is charged for each year of the course. Exemptions may be granted on special grounds, but fees on a somewhat higher scale (see page 16) are charged for classes apart from the prescribed courses. The Directors earnestly advise parents not to seek exemptions, but to take for their children a complete Course of Study.

Special Subjects. In addition to the ordinary subjects of the various courses, instruction by highly-qualified teachers is given in Pianoforte, Violin, Singing and Voice-production, Elocution, Dancing, Cookery, and Dressmaking. (See page 16).

Enrolment of Pupils. New pupils are placed in the year of the Course for which they are, after examination, found to be best fitted. Pupils in the Lower and Upper School should be enrolled at the beginning of the session. To enter the Advanced Classes late is very disadvantageous both to themselves and others.

Examinations. Examinations are periodically conducted in each department by the Rector and Masters. The whole school is also annually examined by the Inspectors appointed by the Scotch Education Department, under their scheme for the examination of Higher Class Schools.

Government Examinations and Certificates. In addition to the general examinations of the School mentioned in the preceding paragraph, there are three special examinations conducted by the Education Department in conjunction with the School authorities, and corresponding to the classification of Schools into Primary, Intermediate, and Secondary mentioned above. These are the Qualifying Examination, the Intermediate Certificate Examination, and the Leaving Certificate Examination. In each of these examinations the pupil is subjected to the triple test of a written examination, an oral examination, and the verdict of the responsible heads of the School on his work.

The Qualifying Examination. Pupils are presented for this Examination, the subjects of which are Elementary English and Arithmetic, at the end of the Fourth Class, and the successful candidates are thereby admitted to the Higher Department of the School, but no grant for Higher Education can be claimed on any pupil who is not 12 years of age, or who has not made at least 80 per cent. of the total possible attendances from the date of enrolment. Pupils who fail to pass this examination at the end of the Fourth Class may be presented for it in any succeeding year.

The Intermediate Certificate Examination. Pupils are generally presented for this examination at the end of the Seventh Class, i.e., after a three years' course of Higher Education, but unsuccessful candidates may, as in the case of the Qualifying Examination, be presented in any succeeding year. Candidates must have been in regular attendance at the School in which they are presented from January preceding the Examination. The subjects of examination are English (including History and Geography), Mathematics, Science, Drawing, and at least one language other than English. There is only one grade of paper set in each subject, known as the Lower Grade (for Higher Grade see under "Leaving Certificate Examination" below). *No pupil can be presented for this Examination who has not made the minimum number of attendances recognised by the Education Department over the three years' course in Science and Drawing.* The whole examination must be passed at one time, but deficiency in one subject will, to some extent, be held to be compensated for by excellence in another. On pupils who have passed this examination the School is able to claim an increased grant over that claimed on pupils who have passed the Qualifying

Examination, but, as in the case of the Qualifying Examination, no grant can be claimed on any pupil who has not made at least 80 per cent. of the total possible attendances. On passing the Intermediate Examination each pupil receives from the Education Department a Certificate known as the Intermediate Certificate, which testifies to his having satisfactorily completed a course of Intermediate Education.

The Leaving Certificate Examination. Candidates for the Leaving Certificate must have completed a course of Post-Intermediate study, of not less than two years' duration, approved by the Education Department, and must, as a rule, have qualified for the award of the Intermediate Certificate in a previous session. The Post-Intermediate Curriculum must provide for the continuous study throughout the course of not less than four of the following subjects :— English, Latin, Greek, French, German, Italian, Spanish, Gaelic, Mathematics, Experimental Science, Geography, History, Drawing, Music, Domestic Science. The number of additional subjects that a pupil may study is left to the discretion of the School Authorities, but it is assumed that provision will always be made for Physical Exercises, and that Music will be taken as a recreative subject at least. For the purposes of this examination there are two grades of papers set in each subject, a Lower and a Higher, except in the case of Italian and Spanish, where there is only a Higher, and in that of Gaelic, where there is only a Lower. The Curriculum must *in all cases* provide for the study on the Higher Grade level of (a) English, with a subsidiary study of History (not reckoned as a separate subject) and, *as a rule*, of (b) one language other than English, and (c) either Mathematics or Science, the remaining subject or subjects being any of those enumerated above, without restriction as to grade. This type of Curriculum, which most pupils are expected to follow, is known as the Normal General Course, and any deviation from it will only be allowed on special application to the Department. In order to qualify for the award of the Leaving Certificate pupils must have passed in at least three subjects, one of which must be English, on the Higher Grade standard, and one on the Lower, but comparative excellence in one subject will be allowed to compensate for slight weakness in another. The Lower Grade subject may be passed either at, or after, the Intermediate stage, but it must be studied throughout the Post-Intermediate Course. Pupils must be presented in English and at least two other subjects in the Higher Grade in the year in which they are candidates for the Leaving Certificate. Lower Grade Passes will not be recorded. In the case of Music and Domestic Science the examination will be conducted on similar lines to those held in Science and Drawing, and particulars of the proposed courses of instruction must be submitted for the approval of the Department at the beginning of the Course on a Form to be supplied for the purpose. Candidates for the Leaving Certificate must not be under 17 years of age on the 1st of January following the year in which they enter for the Examination, and, as in the case of the Intermediate Certificate, they must have been in regular attendance at the School in which they are presented from January preceding the Examination.

Passes in the subjects of the Leaving Certificate Examination are accepted in lieu of their own examinations by the following authorities :—

Reports. A Report of the Progress of each pupil is sent to Parents or Guardians in December, March, and June.

Preparation of Lessons. The amount of home work is regulated and kept within reasonable limits, and to this end printed schedules are issued to pupils from time to time on which to fill in the amount of time spent by them over each lesson, these returns to be corroborated by parents or guardians and handed in to the Rector. The information thus obtained enables overpressure to be more effectually dealt with. Time is also devoted each day, as far as possible, to explaining the work prescribed for next lesson, so that pupils who are diligent and self-reliant may thus master their work without further help. At the same time it will be recognised that a certain amount of time, increasing with the pupil's advance in school, must, in his own interest, be devoted to private study.

Country Pupils. Two class-rooms, one in the Boys' School and one in the Girls' School, are available for the use of pupils who have to wait for trains after school hours. In each of these class-rooms one of the masters is in attendance every day from 3.20 to 3.45 p.m.

Divisions of School Year, School Hours, &c.

The SCHOOL YEAR or Session extends from the beginning of September to the end of June.

The QUARTER DAYS are 1st September, 9th November, 1st February, and 12th April.

The HOLIDAYS, during the School Year, are the Autumn Public Holiday, Victoria Day, the Christmas Holidays, the Easter Holidays, and Three Skating Holidays (at the Rector's discretion).

The SCHOOL HOURS extend, in the case of the Preparatory Classes, from 9 to 1 o'clock ; in the other Classes, from 9 to 3.20.

An INTERVAL OF 35 MINUTES in the Junior and Upper Schools is allowed the pupils for luncheon and recreation in the Playground.

Dinner and Luncheon. Dinner or Luncheon is provided during the interval of 35 minutes allowed for refreshment. The arrangements for purveying are in charge of the Rector and Lady Superintendent, and members of the Staff dine with the pupils. The Dinners and Luncheons are prepared in the School Kitchen under the superintendence of the Teacher of Cookery. Admission to the Lunches which consist of two Courses (Soup and Sweets) is by Ticket.

Tickets, in Books, can be obtained at the Treasurer's Office at the following prices :—

Meat can be obtained on production of a Meat Coupon and payment of fourpence in addition to surrendering a Ticket. (The above prices are subject to alteration from time to time.)

Cocoa and Milk with Cakes, Scones, &c. can also be purchased in the Luncheon Rooms.

School Regulations. The following Rules are taken from the School Regulations :—

- (1) Punctuality, regularity of attendance, and general habits of order, neatness, and politeness are strictly enjoined upon all pupils.

NOTE.—Parents and guardians are earnestly requested not to keep pupils away from School except for illness or some other grave reason. Tea-parties or other pleasure-parties will not be accepted as a sufficient reason for absence.

- (2) Pupils are particularly cautioned against marking or writing upon the benches, walls, or any part of the School buildings.
- (3) **When pupils have been absent from any class they must, on their return, present to the Rector a note from their parents or guardians. This note must explain the cause of absence, and be duly dated and authenticated.** When a pupil is absent beyond three days, a note of explanation is expected to be sent to the Rector, and all requests for leave of absence must be made to him by note at least a day in advance. **Pupils must on no account leave school without a pass from the Rector.**
- (4) When fever or other infectious disease is found to exist in a family, the Rector must be informed immediately, and the members of such family can only be admitted to the classes on producing a Medical Certificate.
- (5) Pupils should not be withdrawn from the school during the session without a note of explanation being sent to the Rector.

F E E S.

Fees are due and payable quarterly in advance. The Quarter Days are 1st September, 9th November, 1st February, and 12th April. A Matriculation Fee is payable by each pupil each session on enrolment. For particulars as to Matriculation Fee, Fees for Prescribed Courses, Fees for Classes apart from the Prescribed Courses, and Fees for Special Subjects, see pp. 15-16.

NOTE.—If a quarterly term is entered upon by a pupil, the whole fee for the quarter must be paid ; but if a pupil has enrolled not less than a month from the beginning of the quarter, or is absent a month or more through illness in the family, a proportional deduction will be made, provided a claim is made before the end of the quarter following that in respect of which the claim is made. No claim of any kind will be considered unless intimated to the Treasurer before 20th June in each session. No deduction, however, will be made unless illness is duly certified, and in no case shall a deduction be allowed from the fees for Pianoforte Instruction, Dancing, or other special subjects.

The Treasurer's Office is at "Courier" Buildings, Dundee, where payment can be made between the hours of 10 and 4 daily ; Saturdays 10 and 12.

Rector's Consultation Hours.

The Rector may be consulted daily from 2.30 to 3.20 o'clock. Parents and others interested in the School are cordially invited to visit the Classes at any time.

Lady Superintendent's Consultation Hours.

The Lady Superintendent may be consulted daily from 1.45 to 2.30 P.M.

The following BURSARIES and SCHOLARSHIPS are within the Patronage of the Directors of the High School of Dundee:—

1. ALEXANDER EDWARD'S BEQUEST for the education of children, giving a preference to those whose parents have been employed at the Works of A. & D. EDWARD & Co. The Bursaries are tenable for four years, and are of the value of £8 each per annum. The Secretary of the High School, Agent.
2. EDWARD BURSARY FUND for the free education of one or more pupils at the Classical and Mathematical Departments of the High School. The Secretary of the High School, Agent.
3. ANDERSON SCHOLARSHIPS.—Two Scholarships of about £30 each at the University of St. Andrews for pupils at the High School who have been in attendance at the School for not less than two years immediately preceding the Competition. The Secretary of the High School, Agent.
4. MISSES BAXTER'S (OF BALGAVIES) SCHOLARSHIPS.—Two Engineering Scholarships of £40, tenable for one year, and renewable for two additional years at the University of Edinburgh for pupils at the High School. Three Bursaries, each of the annual value of £30, and tenable for three years at the University of Edinburgh. Candidates for these Bursaries must have been educated in the High School of Dundee for at least the year preceding the competition. The Secretary of the High School, Agent.

The following BURSARIES and SCHOLARSHIPS are open to Pupils of the High School of Dundee:—

1. THE WILLIAM BYERS' SCHOLARSHIP of the annual value of about £39 is, in the first instance, available for any Student proceeding to graduation at the close of three years in the University of St. Andrews, who is a native of Mains and Strathmartine, or who has received his primary education at the Public Schools of that Parish and his secondary education at the High School of Dundee. 3. 4. THE EDINBURGH ANGUS CLUB BURSARY is open to natives of the County of Forfar who have received their education in that County. DUNDEE BURGH COMMITTEE FOR SECONDARY EDUCATION.

UNIVERSITY BURSARIES.

Two Ferguson Bursaries of the annual value of £25, tenable for three years at the University of St. Andrews, open to those entering on a Three Years' Art Course preparatory to Graduation.

Two Bursaries of the annual value of £25, tenable for three years during an Educational Course at University College, Dundee, or at any Scottish University, or at any Technical School approved of by the Governors.

These four Bursaries will be awarded by competitive examination among those who have been Scholars at a Public or State-aided School in the Burgh or Parish of Dundee, or at the High School of Dundee, for at least one year before the date of examination. Boys and Girls are equally eligible except for the Ferguson Bursaries.

Annual Report by the Rector

TO THE

DIRECTORS OF THE HIGH SCHOOL OF DUNDEE.

HIGH SCHOOL OF DUNDEE,
June, 1919.

GENTLEMEN,

I beg respectfully to submit to you my Annual Report.

During the present session 759 pupils have been enrolled—an increase of 68 on last year's enrolment. In addition 7 Serbian boys have been enrolled, making in all a total of 766. The increase in the enrolment for the present session is 3 more than the large increase of 65 for the previous session, and the combined increase of 133 for the last two sessions taken together is by far the largest that has taken place in two consecutive years since the enrolment began to rise in the year 1905. The increase in this session's enrolment is shared both by the Boys' and the Girls' Schools, and by all Departments of the School—Elementary, Intermediate, and Secondary—the Secondary Department, which had decreased somewhat during the war, showing a considerable increase this year. The enrolment in the Preparatory Departments is increasing steadily year by year, and the Girls' Preparatory Department has now practically reached the limit of its accommodation, while the Boys' has far outgrown it, and is encroaching seriously on the accommodation of the Classical Department. The Girls' School, which for a good many years showed a slower rate of increase in the enrolment than the Boys', has advanced rapidly in this respect during the last few years, the increase for the last two years alone being over 90.

As a result of the recurrent epidemics of influenza throughout the autumn, winter, and spring the attendance during the greater part of the present session has been far below the average, and towards the end of October it fell so low that, on the advice of the Medical Officer of Health, the School, in common with all the other schools in the City, was closed for over three weeks. When it was reopened the attendance showed some improvement, but it rapidly grew worse again, and showed little improvement till the Christmas holidays. The Staff, too, suffered severely, nearly all the younger members giving way one after

another, and as many as eight or nine to a dozen at a time being absent for several weeks. After the Christmas holidays there was a considerable improvement, but the attendance continued much below the average till the end of March. After the Easter holidays there was a very marked improvement, and from that time on till the end of the session it has been remarkably good.

There have been three changes in the Staff during the present Session. In the Science Department Miss Riddoch has been succeeded by Miss Smail, in Gymnastics Mr Sturrock by Miss Smith, and in the Music Department Miss Berry by Miss Coutts. The three new teachers entered on their duties at the beginning of the session, and all three, I am glad to say, have done very good work in their own Departments, and taken a keen and active interest in the general work and life of the School. As a result of the demobilization of teachers following the armistice the High School Masters who were on active service have gradually returned to their posts, Mr Webb arriving at Christmas, Mr Mann five or six weeks later, Mr Macdonald at the beginning of March, and Mr Barr a week or two ago. All these Masters had been officers, with the rank of Captain or Lieutenant, and two of them had been awarded the Military Cross. Of the other Masters who had been absent on military service one—Mr Macbeth, of the English Department—to the deep regret and sorrow of his colleagues and pupils, fell in action about two years ago, and the other two have decided to give up teaching and engage in other work. In the meantime, as the result of the return of the permanent Staff from the Army, the Interim Assistants have been gradually leaving, and at the end of the session all except Miss Jackson will have left. To these Interim Assistants I would here offer my own and my colleagues' sincere and warm thanks for the capable, loyal, and conscientious service rendered by them to the School—a service no less faithful and devoted, I believe, than that rendered by the permanent Staff. To Miss Jackson of the English Department, who has been with us for a longer period than any other Interim teacher, I am under very special obligations for her able and conscientious work as a Teacher and her many good qualities as a colleague, but I also owe much to Mr Stuart, who, during the three years he has been in charge of the Workshop, has won the warm regard of everybody in the school, and to Mr Wilson of the Classical Department, a young teacher of exceptional promise, and a colleague whom it has been a real delight to work with. The Masters who have returned from the Army have, I need hardly say, had the warmest welcome back both from the pupils and from the Staff.

In the matter of repairs and renovations in the School Buildings the chief item to be undertaken during the coming vacation is the painting of a number of classrooms and passages in the Boys' School. The Girls' School has been painted throughout since the new heating and ventilation system was installed some years ago, but the only parts of the Boys' School that have been painted since then are the rooms of the Preparatory and Classical Departments. Another and very urgent requirement is the provision of additional cloak-room accommodation in the Boys' School, the existing accommodation having proved

altogether inadequate to meet the large increase in the enrolment. The matter is at present under consideration, and I hope you will find it possible to carry out this very necessary improvement during the vacation.

The Annual Inspection of the School by the Examiners of the Scotch Education Department took place in the usual way, and their Reports on the various subjects and departments of work examined by them will in due course be in your hands. The other departments have been conducted with the usual efficiency, and notwithstanding the adverse conditions of the autumn and winter—especially the irregular attendance due to influenza—much sound work has been done. The Music Department, which has been growing steadily for years, again shows a considerably increased enrolment, and there has also been an increase in the enrolment in Elocution.

The Literary Societies, the Boys' under the presidency of Mr Meiklejohn, and the Girls' under that of Miss Jackson, have had a successful and enjoyable Session, the numbers being somewhat smaller than in the years preceding the war, but the enthusiasm of the members none the less keen. An interesting feature of the meetings of the Boys' Society was a number of addresses, which were much appreciated, given by some of the former pupils on their work and experiences during the war. The High School Magazine, which has a close connection with, and owes much to the Literary Societies, appeared three times during the session, and, considering that it is almost entirely the work of present pupils, has maintained a very good level of excellence, many of the contributions—and this is one of the great services rendered by the Magazine—revealing powers that do not so easily or naturally manifest themselves in the ordinary work of the classroom.

The various Athletic Clubs of the School have been carried on as usual, but owing to the demands made on their time by the Cadet Corps the senior boys have found it very difficult to give the necessary practice either to football or to swimming during the present session, with the result that the prosperity of these two clubs has been rather seriously affected, and they are in danger of falling off from their former high efficiency. As, however, the command of the Cadet Corps has now been taken over by one of our own Masters—Captain Mann of the Classical Department—it is hoped that at the beginning of next session it may be possible to make arrangements by which the Cadet Corps may be successfully carried on without adversely affecting these or any of the other Athletic Clubs of the School. The Cadet Corps itself has had a most successful session, thanks largely to Mr T. H. Smith, who has not only taken the keenest and most active interest in it in every possible way, but has also attended practically every parade throughout the whole year. Immediately after the close of the session Captain Mann, who, on his return from the Army, very kindly volunteered to take over the command of the Corps, is to take the cadets to camp at Barry—an experience to which they are looking forward with the most eager expectation. In the Girls' School, at the beginning of the present session, under Miss Whyte of the Art Depart-

ment as Captain, we were able to form a company of Girl Guides, who have had a most successful and enjoyable session, have secured many Proficiency Badges, and carried off in their first year the Challenge Shield, a trophy eagerly coveted and keenly competed for annually by all the Guide Companies in Dundee. In this connection I am under great obligation to Miss Brown of the Girls' Preparatory Department, President of the School Drill Section, to whose enthusiasm and careful drilling much of the success of the Guides is due, and to her and to Miss Whyte, the Captain, I would offer my sincere thanks for the services they have rendered to the School in this respect. The Girls' Hockey Club also, I should like to add, is in a most flourishing condition, and has won for the last two years in succession the first place in the Annual Hockey Tournament held at the High School Grounds.

After being suspended during the whole period of the war the High School Sports were revived this session, and held on the afternoon of the 4th of June. Everything combined to make the occasion a memorable one. The weather was warm and beautiful, and the trees round the grounds in rich and almost full leaf; there was a large attendance of parents and friends, and the number of pupils had greatly increased since the last occasion on which the Sports were held; and if the thought of all that had happened in the interval inevitably awoke sad memories in the minds of many who were present, yet one could not help being touched by the bright and hopeful animation of the scene and the evident delight and happiness of the children. A new and interesting feature of the Sports was the presence of the Cadet Corps Band, which played at intervals throughout the afternoon. The Girls' Swimming Gala was also revived this session, and passed off very successfully before a large attendance of spectators on the 20th of June. For the success of this event, and for the prosperous and flourishing condition of the various Clubs and Societies of the Girls' School, I am greatly indebted to the ladies of the Staff who have acted as Presidents, and especially to Miss Olive Smith, the new Gymnastic Instructress, who has enthusiastically associated herself with so many of the outdoor games and recreations of the girls, and carried to such a successful issue the Hockey season and the Swimming Gala. The Boys Swimming Gala, for the reason given above, was not held this year, but it is hoped that it may be possible next year to revive this interesting event, and also the other Displays and Exhibitions that have been suspended during the war.

In the Leaving Certificate Examination the results for the present session, which have just come in, are very satisfactory, the total number of individual passes, the number of Group Certificates, and the proportion of passes to presentations both in Group Certificates and in individual subjects, being almost exactly the same as last year. The only difference is that, as the Higher Grade class was somewhat smaller and the Lower Grade somewhat larger this year, the number of Higher Grade passes and Leaving Certificates is somewhat lower, and the number of Lower Grade passes and Intermediate Certificates somewhat higher than last year. The actual number of individual passes won this year is slightly higher than the

number won last year, and is the highest in the history of the School, having been equalled on one previous occasion, a few years ago, but never exceeded. With regard to University Honours, the results for the present session are only beginning to come in as I write this Report, but from the information that has reached us we have reason to believe that the School is maintaining well its reputation in this respect. Among honours and distinctions recently announced I have pleasure in mentioning that a former pupil of the School, Miss Detta Wattie, who graduated with First Class Honours in Classics at Aberdeen University two years ago, has gained a First Class in Part I. of the Classical Tripos Examination at Cambridge University, while another former pupil, Professor Norman K. Smith of Princeton University, has just been appointed Professor of Logic and Metaphysics in the University of Edinburgh.

It remains for me, before closing my Report, to refer to the record of the School in the war during the past year, and in this respect, as the armistice was declared only a few months after I wrote my last Report, I have, fortunately, less to say than in any other of my Reports since the outbreak of the war. Of the total number of names on the Roll of Honour I have been unable, since the introduction of compulsory service, to get any accurate figures, but as it stood at about 500 two years ago, it can hardly be less, and may well be a good deal more than 600 now. Nor can I, either, give anything like accurate figures as to the number of commissions held by former pupils, but from the information we have they must amount to at least 55 to 60 per cent. of the total enlistments. Of those who obtained commissions the majority, naturally, held the rank of Lieutenant or Second Lieutenant, but a large number reached that of Captain or Major, and a good many higher rank still. As regards military honours and distinction, the total number, which a year ago had reached 46, now stands at 60. Among the recipients of the higher and more unusual kind of honours I have much pleasure in mentioning that Lieutenant-Colonel Peter S. Nicoll, a former pupil and former Director of the School, has been made a Commander of the British Empire, while Captain Leonard A. Elgood, who had already been mentioned in despatches and won the Military Cross, has had conferred on him the Order of the British Empire. On the other hand, I deeply regret to say that during the past year nine former pupils, four of them holding the rank of Captain, have fallen in action or died of wounds or from illness. This brings our total list of those who have fallen in the war up to 86, but as the great majority of these were officers, and information is not so easily obtained in the case of privates, the full number must be a good deal higher than that. To those who have won honours or promotion during the past year, and to their parents and relatives I would offer my own and the Staff's warm congratulations, and to those who have lost children or other near relations I would offer our sincere and deep sympathy in their bereavement. As regards the present pupils and the staff, and the help given by them in the war, I am glad to say that their contributions through the War Savings Association during the past year have amounted to £1,580, bringing the total up to £7,800.

They have also contributed to various war charities throughout the session, and last January they gave a Dramatic Entertainment, the proceeds of which, amounting, after deduction of expenses, to over £100, were given to the Fund for Blinded Soldiers and Sailors.

In conclusion, I would offer my sincere and hearty thanks to colleagues, pupils, parents, Directors, and all concerned, for the support and encouragement I have received throughout the session. I wish also to acknowledge here with very special gratitude the splendid loyalty of the Staff, the kindly and sympathetic attitude of the Directors, and the constant and most ungrudging help given me by the Conveners during the anxious and difficult years of the war, and to express the fervent hope that the peace so dearly won, and now at length concluded, may prove a lasting and beneficent one.

REPORTS AS FOLLOWS :—

GENERAL REMARKS.

A further increase in the enrolment in the Primary and Intermediate Departments has raised the total from 691 to 766. In this number are included seven Serbian boys still in attendance here. With the continuous growth of the School in size, the available accommodation is now taxed to the utmost, and any further extension seems likely to prove highly embarrassing. Of the six teachers who joined the army, one was killed early in the war, one has chosen to remain with the colours, three recently demobilised have resumed work, and the discharge of the sixth is expected soon. The interim teachers, of whom only two are still on the staff, have as a rule proved themselves efficient substitutes; and by the strenuous efforts of the Rector and the other permanent teachers the high level of efficiency, that has long characterised the School, has been wonderfully well maintained. That the results of this session's examinations, oral and written, are so satisfactory, is the more creditable in view of the exceptional amount of sickness, and also of the fact that no addition has been made to the staff such as in normal times the increased enrolment would have been taken to necessitate. The general tone of the School continues admirable.

ENGLISH.

In the English Department a very successful year's work has been overtaken. The teaching staff is highly competent; and no efforts have been spared to cultivate in the pupils a wholesale appreciation for the best in English literature. The Intermediate classes did very well in both written and oral tests, and had evidently been handled with much success.

The Post-Intermediate candidates made a very favourable impression under oral examination. They had covered a wide field of English study, were able to show an intelligent familiarity with the authors studied, and could express their thoughts with lucidity and considerable fluency. From their English studies as a whole they had obviously derived much intellectual benefit.

CLASSICS.

In the Classical Department the reading of continuous prose is begun early and is systematically developed in a well considered and well graded programme. The pupils who complete the curriculum have consequently overtaken an exceptionally wide field of study in both prose and verse. Composition is taught with equal care and thoroughness. Repetition of verse is systematically practised in the more advanced stages. All the classes seen this session were found in a sound condition of efficiency. The appearance made by the three highest in both Latin and Greek is especially commendable.

FRENCH.

The work of the French Department continues to be conducted with the customary care and thoroughness, and when all circumstances are taken into account, the results obtained are creditable, those at the Leaving Certificate stage being especially so. Oral exercises are satisfactorily developed, but readier response and clearer enunciation are to be expected in the more advanced sections. Certain matters of detail were fully discussed with the head of the Department; the only point that seems worthy of mention here is whether the work with the Preparatory and Qualifying Classes might not be entrusted to another teacher instead of the Principal Master, whose time perhaps could be more profitably employed.

GERMAN.

There are 52 pupils studying German—a slight increase on last year—of whom 23 are beginners, 19 are in the second year, 9 in the third year, and 1 (an exceptionally proficient pupil) in the fourth.

The teaching of the subject throughout reaches a very high standard, and excellent progress has been made. Much suitable reading has been overtaken, recitation has been regularly practised, and very careful attention has been paid to the training of the ear. Nine candidates were presented this year at the Intermediate stage and all passed.

MATHEMATICS.

In the Mathematical Department a very successful session's work has been accomplished. Both orally and in writing the pupils showed a firm grasp of the fundamental

facts and principles, a grasp that could have been acquired only by very thorough training. In addition to what is included in the ordinary curriculum a great deal of higher work has been overtaken by the most advanced pupils. The very satisfactory results in the written papers in Analytical Geometry, Elements of Dynamics, and Higher Dynamics may be taken as an indication of the value and success of the instruction not only in those, but in all the additional subjects.

EXPERIMENTAL SCIENCE.

The work all over is sound and good, and the pupils carry out their experiments methodically and with accuracy. A little more attention might with advantage be given to the records of experiments and observations in the pupils' notebooks. The schemes are generous and well covered.

DRAWING.

The representation of form in Drawing is successfully carried out, especially in the drawing of planes where weakness is so often found. Tone is less successfully treated, but the work over all shows much promise. One or two drawings on a larger scale might with advantage be carried out by candidates for Higher Drawing.

EDUCATIONAL HANDWORK.

Practical exercises in the School Workshop have been well performed in the absence of the regular instructor, who has now left. The scheme will be re-organised under the new instructor.

PRIMARY DEPARTMENT.

Despite handicaps, probably unprecedented, very good work has been done in both the boys' and the girls' classes. At the Qualifying Examination fully four-fifths of those presented did very well. Those who failed showed weakness in Spelling, Handwriting, and Composition.

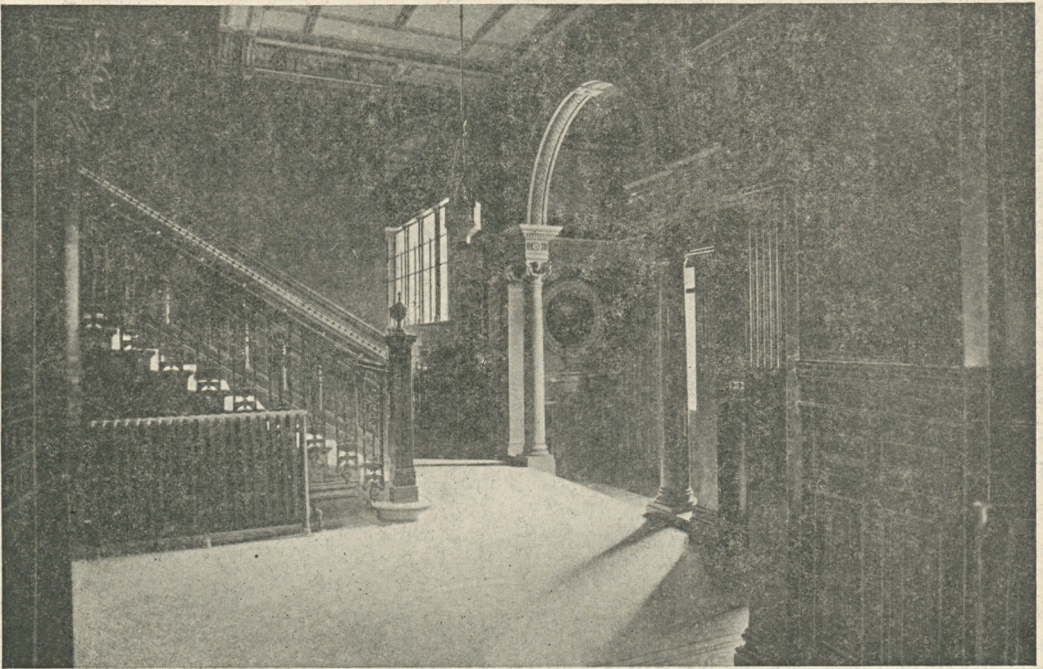
