BURSARIES AND SCHOLARSHIPS

- The following BURSARIES and SCHOLARSHIPS are within the Patronage of the Directors of the High School of Dundee:—
- 1. ALEXANDER EDWARD'S BEQUEST for the education of children, giving a preference to those whose parents have been employed at the Works of A. & D. Edward & Co. The Bursaries are tenable for four years, and entitle the holder to free education at the school.
- 2. EDWARD BURSARY FUND for the education of one or more pupils at the High School.
- 3. ANDERSON SCHOLARSHIPS.—Three Scholarships of about £30 each at the University of St. Andrews for pupils who have attended the High School for not less than two years immediately preceding the Competition.
- 4. THE MISSES BAXTER'S (OF BALGAVIES) SCHOLARSHIPS.—
 Two Engineering Scholarships of £40, tenable for one year, and renewable for two additional years at the University of Edinburgh. Three Bursaries, each of the annual value of £38, and tenable for three years at the University of Edinburgh. Candidates for these Bursaries must have been educated at the High School of Dundee for at least the year preceding the competition.
- DAVID KENNETH MAXWELL BURSARY for the education of children whose parents or guardians need aid, the Bursary to be used in payment of High School fees and books as arranged.
- The following BURSARIES and SCHOLARSHIPS are open to the Pupils of the High School of Dundee:—
- THE LOWSON MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP of £80, tenable for two years at any University in the United Kingdom, is open to Students who have attended some School in Dundee or Broughty Ferry for three years, and who have not been in attendance at a University for a longer period than one Session. - 2. THE SPENCE BURSARIES of the value of £30 for the first year of tenure and £40 for the second year, are open to Students who have passed through the High School, or other Schools in the Counties of Forfar, Fife, Kinross, and Perth, and who are about to enter on the second or third Session of their Academic Course either at the University of St. Andrews or of Edinburgh. 3. EDINBURGH ANGUS CLUB—DALHOUSIE BURSARIES—Two Bursaries of £40 per annum for three or four years. Tenable in Arts at Edinburgh University. Preference is given to natives of Angus or to candidates who have been educated at a School or Schools in the County for not less than five years. The Bursaries are awarded on the basis of the Entrance Bursary Examination. Patrons—The Edinburgh Angus Club Educational Trust. Apply for information to F. G. Bursarles and Scholarships are available as follows, viz.:-

SCHOOL BURSARIES.

- Six Bursaries, or thereby, each tenable for 5 or 6 years in the Secondary Department of the High School of the annual value of £20, are awarded by competition, among scholars who are inhabitants of Dundee, and whose parents or guardians require financial aid in providing their children with Secondary Education.
- Special Bursaries may be awarded to any scholar undergoing a course of secondary education in the High School, if, owing to the death of a parent, or a change in the financial circumstances of the family, the scholar would otherwise be compelled to leave school before completing the full course. UNIVERSITY BURSARIES.

1. Residential Scholarship.

One Residential Scholarship tenable for 3 or 4 years at the University of St. Andrews, of an annual value of £100 is awarded by competition among inhabitants of Dundee, in attendance at a Secondary School, who require financial aid to enable them to attend the said University, and to reside in a Residential Hall of the University.

2. (a) Entrance Bursaries.

Four Bursaries, or thereby, each tenable for 3 years at any Scottish University, of an annual value of £50 or thereby, are awarded by competition among inhabitants of Dundee in attendance at any school where secondary education is provided and who require financial aid.

(b) Under-Graduate Bursaries.

Bursaries of £50 or thereby are also awarded by competition or otherwise to inhabitants of Dundee already in attendance at a University, who require financial aid to enable them to complete their University education.

CENTRAL INSTITUTION BURSARIES.

Bursaries of the standard value of £50 per annum, tenable for such period as may be fixed by the Governors in each case, at a Central Institution, Training College or the School of Economics and Commerce, open to inhabitants of Dundee who require financial assistance to attend courses at these Institutions, may be available.

PROSPECTUS

Session 1948-49

THE HIGH SCHOOL OF DUNDEE consists of two Schools—a Boys' School and a Girls' School—and provides a complete course of primary and secondary education for both boys and girls. It supplies instruction in all the usual English branches, and also in Classics, Modern Languages, Mathematics, Science, Technical Subjects, Commerce, Music, Art, and Domestic Subjects. Provision is made for physical training and recreation. The Boys' School has a Cadet Corps and a Rifle Club, and the Girls' School a Company of Girl Guides and of Rangers. Both Schools have Literary Societies, and there is a School Magazine and a School Library.

ORGANIZATION

The School is divided into two grades:—

I.-LOWER SCHOOL-Classes Ic. to V.

II.-UPPER SCHOOL-Forms I. to VI.

The Lower School.—The Preparatory Department comprises Classes Ic., Ib., Ia. In Classes I. to IV. the main subjects are English and Arithmetic. In Class V. French is added. Art, Singing, Nature Study, Gymnastics, and, for Girls, Sewing, are taught throughout.

The Upper School is for pupils from about 12 years of age upwards. In Form I. Latin, Mathematics, and Science are added to the curriculum. Technical Subjects may, with the Rector's permission, be taken instead of Latin. From Form II. upwards the school has parallel courses of instruction—Classical, Modern, Technical and Commercial. Parents should be careful at this stage to notify the Rector which of these Courses they wish their children to enter. In Form IV. the Domestic Course (for Girls) is added.

Special Subjects. In addition to the ordinary subjects of the curriculum, instruction is given in Pianoforte, Violin, Singing and Voice production, Elocution and Dancing.

Enrolment of Pupils. Pupils should be enrolled well in advance of their date of entry to the School. An entrance examination for each class above Lower Ic. is held in May. There is at present a Waiting List.

Examinations. The School is inspected by the Scottish Education Department. There are two examinations conducted by the Department in conjunction with the School Authorities, namely, the Qualifying Examination, and the Senior Leaving Certificate. An examination for promotion to a Leaving Certificate Course is held in Form III. Successful candidates are awarded an Intermediate Certificate by the School.

Medical Inspection. All pupils are medically inspected periodically throughout the course.

Reports. A Report of the Progress of each pupil is sent to Parents or Guardians in December, March, and June. Pupils are expected to earn their promotion.

Preparation of Lessons. The amount of homework is regulated and kept within reasonable limits. At the same time it will be recognised that a certain amount of time, increasing with the pupil's advance in school, must, in his own interest, be devoted to private study.

Country Pupils. Class-rooms may be made available for the use of pupils who have to wait for trains after school hours.

School Hours, etc.

The School Hours extend, in the case of Classes Ic. and Ib. from 9 a.m. to 12.50 p.m.; in Ia. to IV. from 9 to 3.10; in the other Classes, from 9 to 3.55.

An Interval of One Hour is allowed for luncheon; Juniors 12.5 to 1.5, Seniors 12.50 to 1.50.

Luncheon. The Lunches served consist of two courses, soup and meat or meat and sweet. There are two sittings—one for the lower and the other for the upper school—and admission is by a ticket available for all school days in each quarter. The charge for the ticket—at the rate of 6d per meal—is included in the Quarterly Fee Account, and on payment of the Fees the Ticket is issued by the Treasurer. Pupils must have their tickets by the first day of each quarter and carry them regularly. They must be shown in the Dining Hall on request.

Adjustments in respect of five or more consecutive days' absence recorded in the School Register will be made in the following quarter's charge.

Should the holder discontinue attendance at meals, the ticket must be surrendered at the Treasurer's office where repayment will be made in respect of any unexpired period after the date of surrender.

Cakes, scones etc., can also be purchased in the luncheon-room at the forenoon break.

School Regulations. The attention of Parents is specially drawn to the following Regulations:—

(1) Punctuality, regularity of attendance, and general habits of order, neatness, and politeness are strictly enjoined upon all pupils.

NOTE.—Except for illness or some other grave reason, pupils may not be absent without the Rector's permission. All requests for leave of absence must be made by note at least a day in advance.

- (2) When pupils have been absent from any class they must, on their return, present to the Rector a note from their parents or guardians. This note must explain the cause of absence, and be duly dated and authenticated. When a pupil is absent beyond three days, a note of explanation is expected to be sent to the Rector. Pupils must on no account leave school without a pass from the Rector.
- (3) When infectious disease is found to exist in a family, the Rector must be informed immediately, and the members of such family can only be admitted to school on producing a Medical Certificate.
- (4) (a) There is a school uniform which must be worn by girls attending the School.
 - (b) Regulation Rugby Football, Cricket and Gymnastic Clothing must be provided.
 - (c) All Clothing, Books, etc., must be marked with the owner's name.
 - (d) Boys are expected to wear School Colours with shorts or grey flannels, or highland dress.
 - (e) Old school uniform should not be given away in the town. It should be brought to school, and will be sent to charitable institutions elsewhere.

NOTE.—The clothing regulations are relaxed until further notice, except that the School tie must be worn.

(5) Pupils attending the School are not allowed to smoke. The co-operation of parents is particularly requested in enforcing this rule.

The above Fees include Fees for Tuition and Charges for use of Recreation Grounds, Writing, Drawing and Science Materials, but do not include Fees for Special Subjects.

Notice in writing covering one full school quarter must be given of the withdrawal of a pupil during a Session, and pupils not intending to return to school at the beginning of a Session must give notice to that effect not later than the previous 15th of June. An additional quarter's fee must be paid if the requisite notice of withdrawal has not been given.

Pupils entering the School for the first time in the course of a quarter will be charged at the rate of one-seventh of a full quarter's fee in respect of every week or part thereof from the date of entry to the end of the quarter.

No rebate will be granted in respect of the absence of a pupil on account of illness or other cause.

When more than three pupils attend from any one family, every pupil after the third is charged only half the inclusive Fee.

II. LOCKERS-

Girls who wish to have the use of a Locker at School must, at the beginning of the Session, deposit 2/- with the Lady Warden. This deposit will be returned when the pupil gives up her key at the end of the Session.

For the use of a Locker in the Recreation Pavilion pupils are charged 3/- for either Winter or Summer Season, or 5/- for the year.

III.—OUTSIDE DISTRICT FEES—

If the parents of pupils in the Upper School live outside the Dundee Education area, they are charged the following additional Fees unless they produce a Permit to attend the School from the Education Committee of the district in which they reside:—

ANNUAL REPORT BY THE RECTOR

to the

Directors of the High School of Dundee

High School of Dundee, July, 1948.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

The total number of enrolments for the Session 1947-48 has been 948. In consequence, accommodation has continued to be severely taxed, but the erection of the two new classrooms on the west side of the School has provided a certain measure of relief. On the other hand, when these rooms were brought into use we had to give up the Hall of the Original Secession Church which had been put at our disposal for the last six years. Our thanks are due to the Minister and Office-bearers of the Church for the kindness and consideration which they have invariably shown to us during that period. Enrolments for next year are again very numerous, and there is a Waiting List which now extends to 1953. Entrance above the beginners' class is by examination, although priority is given to those who have a close connection with the School provided that they attain the necessary standard. In Class Lower Ic. all those who have brothers or sisters in the School or are the sons and daughters of former pupils have been accommodated, if their applications were lodged before the end of 1947. Apart from these, other entries were accepted in accordance with the date of application. The chief pressure is in the Lower School. It is practically always possible to accommodate at short notice applicants above Form I.

Work during the year has been satisfactory. Results in the Senior Leaving Certificate Examination were very good, over 80% of the candidates securing the Group Certificate. It is, however, a little difficult to estimate the standard of work by percentages. Schools differ in the policy which they pursue when presenting pupils, and there is no doubt that the quality of candidates varies considerably from year to year. The results of the internal examination which we set in the third year were also very much better than in 1947. There were 67 candidates from Form III., of whom 53 passed, and 20 from Form IV. (Remove), of whom 13 passed. These, I think, are satisfactory results, as every pupil who had reached that stage of the School was presented.

At the St. Andrews University Bursary Competition Donald Sykes gained second place, and has been awarded the Dundee Educational Trust Residential Scholarship. Eric Matheson also gained a good place on the List. Other pupils did reasonably well in the Competition at University College, Dundee. David Hilton has gained the Boys' Leng Gold Medal for Singing, the first success which we have had in this Competition for many years. At the Universities many of our old pupils have done very well indeed. In particular, mention must be made of the Wranglership in Part II. of the Cambridge Mathematical Tripos which has been gained by Henry Jack. Walter Perry has graduated M.D. (London) with commendation, and has been awarded a Rutherford Silver Medal. At St. Andrews, Kenneth Elliott is medallist in the general Greek Class. John Brough, who is a distinguished graduate of Edinburgh and Cambridge, has been appointed Professor of Sanskrit in the University of London (School of Oriental Studies), while Martin Fearn (St. Andrews), has been appointed Economic Adviser to the Secretary of State for Scotland.

Important changes are likely to be made in the Leaving Certificate Examination in 1950. In future it will not be necessary to present candidates for any specified group. They will be permitted to take in the Examination any subjects for which they are likely to be fitted, and they will receive a Certificate stating the subjects in which they have passed. In the fourth year, candidates who are leaving School at the end of that year may be presented in a number of subjects on the lower grade, but if they mean to remain at school for a fifth or sixth year they will not be permitted to take more than one Lower Grade in the fourth year. As most of the pupils in Dundee High School are looking forward to a Certificate of Entrance to the Universities, this arrangement will not differ very much from that which exists at present. It will still be necessary for them to aim at a number of higher grade passes to enable them to obtain the Certificate of Fitness for University Entrance. There is going to be an "Advanced" Certificate in practically every subject for candidates in the sixth form who have already passed on the higher grade. I think these arrangements are on the right lines. They are more flexible than at present, and while in certain cases time-tabling may be rather difficult I think they are in the best interests of the pupils and likely to lead to a better standard of work. At the same time, the change should mean less pressure on the average pupil.

There have been numerous changes on the staff. We are losing Mrs Todd (Miss Moira Martin) who, both as pupil and teacher, has had a long connection with the School and who is now going abroad to join her husband. She has given very valuable service in the Primary Department, and is being replaced by Miss Margaret Hutton who is also an old pupil. Miss Davidson,

Assistant Mistress in Art and Needlework, and Miss Cruickshank, of the Modern Languages Department, are also leaving to be married. They have done excellent work, and our best wishes for the future accompany them. Mr Ferguson is leaving to take charge of the Department of English in the Methodist College, Belfast. His scholarship and energy have contributed greatly to the success of the English Department during the past year, and we hope that he will be equally successful and happy in his new Miss Brodlie is going to the United States for a year under the Scheme for the Exchange of Teachers, and we welcome Miss Hagaman in her place Miss Davidson's place is being taken by Miss Joan Cuthill, of Morrison's Academy, Crieff; Miss Cruickshank's by Mr D. J. Bisset, who, after serving in the Forces, has recently completed his course at St. Andrews and Dundee Training College: and Mr A. R. Duke, of the Harris Academy, is succeeding Mr Ferguson. We are also losing McCulloch who has been fireman and caretaker of the Girls' School for twenty-six years He has given splendid service to the School during these years. Our best wishes go with him and Mrs McCulloch for a long period of health and happiness in his retirement.

Unfortunately, I must mention the death of Miss Duthie who was for many years Headmistress of the Junior Girls' Department. Miss Duthie always had the interests of the School and her pupils very much at heart, and her suggestions in all matters of education were of the utmost value. We miss her very much indeed. I have also to record the death of Graeme Anderson, Form II. He was a bright, happy and promising boy. Our sympathy goes out to his parents and their family in their grievous loss.

In games, pride of place must go to the Rugby XV. They had an extended programme which included several schools in Edinburgh and Glasgow, and they proved themselves a first-rate side—certainly as good as any I have seen in Dundee High School. Other successes were not so marked, but hockey, tennis, swimming and athletics all showed enthusiasm and promise, and there were several very good individual performances—the swimming champions, for example, and Sydney Hynd's record in the broad jump. The results of the Cricket XI. did not equal their initial promise.

In other ways we have had a crowded session. The Cadet Corps is flourishing, popular and efficient. At the Examination for Certificate "A," 42 candidates were presented and 37 passed—a very gratifying result. Here too we are on the eve of re-organisation, for School Cadet Corps and Junior Training Corps are being combined into a single Pre-service Training Unit—again I think the step is in the right direction. This year the Corps has been in camp at Inverness. The Rangers have spread their wings still further and gone to Mull, while the Guides held their camp in

Glenqueich. The success of the training which girls receive in these organisations is evidenced by the fact that Anne Thomson has gained the Juliet Lowe Scholarship for International Guiding, open to all British Rangers, and is one of the two British representatives at a Meeting in Switzerland this summer. Margaret Watson has obtained the Queen's Guide Award—the highest award obtainable in the Guide Movement. Three pupils are again participating this year in the exchange visit organised by the Dundee-Orleans Fellowship.

We are also once again holding a Forestry Camp at Strathyre for four weeks, and though numbers are not as high as last year we hope that much useful work will be done. Last Autumn, some 50 pupils assisted with the potato harvest, and a request has been received from the Board of Agriculture for further assistance this Autumn.

Attendance at the School Societies has been fully maintained, and the participation of younger members in all their activities is particularly welcome. A number of very interesting lectures have been given, among which may be mentioned the Reverend Harry Andrew's lantern lecture "In the Wake of a War Canoe" and Principal Wimberley's address on "A Soldier's Travels". Joint Musical Evening has come to be a marked feature of these Societies, and the standard of performance is very high indeed. A recital by elocution pupils was given towards the end of the second term. A good level was reached and was greatly appreciated by parents and others. This recital is meant to indicate the ordinary method of work throughout the School and is not confined to a select group of pupils. Many High School pupils were also prominent in Miss Dickie's dancing display which was given in the Caird Hall. The exhibitions of Art and Needlework in June were well attended by large numbers of interested spectators. The work was marked by high quality, variety and imagination. As great difficulty is still experienced in obtaining the necessary supplies, the Departments concerned are to be congratulated on the standard which was attained. We also renewed the display in Gymnastics, and it proved very attractive indeed. During the last week of the session a real finale was reached in the performance of "H.M.S. PINAFORE" which was at least up to the level of any previous presentation by the School of the operas of Gilbert and Sullivan. We have to thank Mr Millar, Mr Cruden and Mr Douglas Robertson for the interest they took in producing and staging this opera. Without their help it would not be possible to reach anything like such a high standard as we have come to associate with these performances. At the Prize-giving of the Lower School a very attractive exhibition was given by pupils of the Preparatory Department and L.V. Girls, which was full of promise for the future of stagecraft in the School.

On the Sunday before Christmas, the School took part in a Carol Service in St. Mary's. This was a new departure and we have to thank Dr. Duncan for his co-operation and help. Dr. Duncan conducted a further service for the School in the summer term when the Cadet Corps and the Company of Girl Guides were on parade. These services are very well attended by pupils, parents and friends, and have an excellent influence on the life of the School.

I should like to express my thanks for the interest which the Old Boys' and Old Girls' Clubs are taking in our activities. Liaison Committee has been established between the Old Boys and the School in order that we can keep closely in touch with one another. While the Committee is still in its infancy, I feel that this is likely to be effective in maintaining close contact between past and present pupils. In this way, all will be able to realise their essential identity much more effectively than in the past. The advantage to the School of such association is obvious. During the session a War Memorial Appeal was launched, and the School has already contributed a considerable sum. Collections have been made in the School, and a sum of £54, the proceeds from the performance of "H.M.S. PINAFORE," has been given to the Fund. It is hoped that there will still be a large response to the Appeal. The eventual aim is to provide either a Hall or a Library, or some similar building, in the Reconstructed School in memory of those who have fallen. In the meantime a bronze plaque, designed by Mr Halliday, will be placed in a suitable position, but the intention is to transfer the plaque to a Memorial Building in the Reconstructed School.

These activities make heavy demands on the time and attention of the staff all of whom give their help ungrudgingly in order to make the School a small community in which we hope that boys and girls will be trained to play their part in the greater society of the future.

I should also like to thank the Directors for their support and encouragement, and for the close attention which they have given to the interests and needs of the School.
