

BURSARIES AND SCHOLARSHIPS

The following BURSARIES and SCHOLARSHIPS are within the Patronage of the Directors of the High School of Dundee:—

- 1. ALEXANDER EDWARD'S BEQUEST for the education of children, giving a preference to those whose parents have been employed at the Works of A. & D. Edward & Co. The Bursaries are tenable for four years, and entitle the holder to free education at the school.
- 2. EDWARD BURSARY FUND for the education of one or more pupils at the High School.
- ANDERSON SCHOLARSHIPS.—These Scholarships of about £30
 each are tenable at the University of St. Andrews by pupils who have
 attended the High School for not less than two years immediately preceding the Competition.
- 4. THE MISSES BAXTER'S (OF BALGAVIES) SCHOLARSHIP.— Two Engineering Scholarships of £40, tenable for one year, and renewable for two additional years at the University of Edinburgh. Three Bursaries, each of the annual value of £38, and tenable for three years at the University of Edinburgh. Candidates for these Bursaries must have been educated at the High School of Dundee for at least the year preceding the competition.
- 5 DAVID KENNETH MAXWELL BURSARY for the education of children whose parents or guardians need aid, the Bursary to be used in payment of High School fees and books as arranged.

The following BURSARIES and SCHOLARSHIPS are open to the Pupils of the High School of Dundee:—

- THE LOWSON MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP of £80, tenable for two years at any University in the United Kingdom, is open to Students who have attended some School in Dundee or Broughty Ferry for three years, and who have not been in attendance at a University for a longer period than one Session. - 2. THE SPENCE BURSARIES.—These Bursaries are open to students of Classics or Mathematics who have completed one academic year in the Faculties of Arts or Science. They are tenable for two years and are open to men and women studying in the Universities of Edinburgh or St. Andrews (including Dundee) and are awarded on the results of a competitive examination by the Governors of the Spence Bursary Trust. Full particulars of the Bursaries available in any year and of the conditions of examination, award and tenure may be obtained from the Factor of the Trust, Mr R. W. Matthewson, B.L., C.A., 1 Bank Street, Dundee. Entry forms may be obtained from the Factor. The examination is held in June in two centres, namely, Edinburgh and St. Andrews. No payment in respect of a Spence Bursary will be made which would bring the recipient's Bursary income to above £160.
 A Continuation Bursary of the value of £50, tenable for one year, may be

A Continuation Bursary of the value of £50, tenable for one year, may be granted to any holder of a Spence Bursary of whose merit and progress the Governors are satisfied, provided the Bursar's course of study is approved by the Governors.

3. EDINBURGH ANGUS CLUB—DALHOUSIE BURSARIES.—Two Bursaries of £40 per annum for three or four years. Tenable in Arts at Ediuburgh University. Preference is given to natives of Angus or to candidates who have been educated at a School or Schools in the County for not less than five years. The Bursaries are awarded on the basis of the Entrance Bursary Examination. Patrons—The Edinburgh Angus Club Educational Trust. Apply for information to H. L. DUNDEE EDUCATIONAL TRUST

Bursaries and Scholarships are available as follows, viz:-

SCHOOL BURSARIES

Six Bursaries, or thereby, each tenable for 5 or 6 years in the Secondary Department of the High School, are awarded by competition among scholars who are inhabitants of Dundee, and whose parents or guardians require financial aid in providing their children with Secondary Education. The Trust pays the School fees and allows in addition the sum of £5 for books and other expenses.

Special Bursaries may be awarded to any scholar undergoing a course of secondary education in the High School, if, owing to the death of a parent, or a change in the financial circumstances of the family, the scholar would otherwise be compelled to leave school before completing the full course. Forms of Application, etc., may be had from Frank Hay, Clerk and Factor, 148 Nethergate, Dundee.

UNIVERSITY BURSARIES

1. Residential Scholarship.

One Residental Scholarship tenable for 3 or 4 years at the University of St Andrews, of an annual value of £100 is awarded by competition among inhabitants of Dundee, in attendance at a Secondary School, who require financial aid to enable them to attend the said University, and to reside in a Residential Hall of the University.

2. (a) Entrance Bursaries.

Four Bursaries, or thereby, each tenable for 3 years at any Scottish University, of an annual value of £50 or thereby, are awarded by competition among inhabitants of Dundee in attendance at any school where secondary education is provided and who require financial aid.

(b) Under-Graduate Bursaries.

Bursaries of £50 or thereby are also awarded by competition or otherwise to inhabitants of Dundee already in attendance at a University, who require financial aid to enable them to complete their University education.

CENTRAL INSTITUTION BURSARIES

Bursaries of the standard value of £50 per annum, tenable for such period as may be fixed by the Governors in each case, at a Central Institution, Training College, or the School of Economics and Commerce, open to inhabitants of Dundee who require financial assistance to attend courses at these Institutions, may be available.

PROSPECTUS

Session 1954-55

THE HIGH SCHOOL OF DUNDEE consists of two Schools—a Boys' School and a Girls' School—and provides a complete course of primary and secondary education for both boys and girls. It supplies instruction in all the usual English branches, and also in Classics, Modern Languages, Mathematics, Science, Technical Subjects, Commerce, Music, Art, and Domestic Subjects. Provision is made for physical training and recreation. The Boys' School has a Cadet Corps and a Rifle Club, and the Girls' School a Company of Girl Guides. Both Schools have Literary Societies, and there is a School Magazine and a School Library.

ORGANISATION

The School is divided into two grades:-

L-LOWER SCHOOL-Classes I to VII.

II.—UPPER SCHOOL—Forms I to VI.

THE LOWER SCHOOL.—The Preparatory Department comprises Classes I, II and III. In Classes I to VI the main subjects are English and Arithmetic. In Class VII French is added. Art, Singing, Nature Study, Gymnastics, and, for Girls, Sewing, are taught throughout.

THE UPPER SCHOOL is for pupils from about 12 years of age upwards. In Form I Latin or Technical Subjects, Mathematics, and Science are added to the curriculum. From Form II upwards the School has parallel courses of instruction—Classical, Modern, Technical and Commercial. In Form IV the Domestic Course (for Girls) is added. The Rector's permission is required for entry to the different Courses.

Special Subjects. In addition to the ordinary subjects of the curriculum, instruction is given in Pianoforte, Violin, Singing and Voice Production, Elocution and Dancing.

Enrolment of Pupils. Pupils should be enrolled well in advance of their date of entry to the School. An entrance examination for each class above Lower I is held in May if there are any vacancies. There is at present a Waiting List.

Examinations.—The School is inspected by the Scottish Education Department, and pupils are prepared for the Scottish Leaving Certificate. A "Qualifying" examination is held in Class Lower VII. In Form III an examination is held for promotion to a Leaving Certificate course, and successful candidates are awarded an Intermediate Certificate by the School.

Medical Inspection. All pupils are medically inspected periodically throughout the course.

Reports. A Report of the Progress of each pupil is sent to Parents or Guardians in December, March, and June. Pupils are expected to earn their promotion.

Preparation of Lessons. The amount of homework is regulated and kept within reasonable limits. At the same time it will be recognised that a certain amount of time, increasing with the pupil's advance in School, must, in his own interest, be devoted to private study.

Country Pupils. Class-rooms may be made available for the use of pupils who have to wait for trains after School hours.

School Hours, etc.

The School Hours extend, in the case of Class I from 9 a.m. to 12.45 p.m.; in II to VI, from 9 to 3.10; in the other Classes, from 9 to 3.55.

An Interval of One Hour is allowed for luncheon; Juniors 12.5 to 1.5, Seniors 12.45 to 1.45. Class Lower II take the second lunch.

Luncheon. The Lunches served consist of two courses, soup and meat or meat and sweet. There are two sittings, and admission is by a ticket available for all school days in each quarter. The charge for the ticket—at the rate of 10d. per meal—is included in the Quarterly Fee Account, and on payment of the Fees the Ticket is issued by the Treasurer. Pupils must have their tickets by the first day of each quarter and carry them regularly. They must be shown in the Dining Hall on request.

Adjustments in respect of five or more consecutive days' absence recorded in the School Register will be made in the following quarter's charge.

The Directors reserve the right to vary the charges for meals during the Session on giving one month's notice prior to any quarter day.

Should the holder discontinue attendance at meals, intimation should be made to the Rector and the ticket surrendered at the Treasurer's office, where repayment will be made in respect of any unexpired period after the date of intimation or surrender.

Cakes, scones, etc., can also be purchased at the forenoon break.

School Regulations. The attention of Parents is specially drawn to the following Regulations:—

 Punctuality, regularity of attendance, and general habits of order, neatness, and politeness are strictly enjoined upon all pupils.

NOTE.—Except for illness or some other grave reason, pupils may not be absent without the Rector's permission. All requests for leave of absence must be made by note at least a day in advance.

- (2) When pupils have been absent from any class they must, on their return, bring with them a note from their parents or guardians. This note must explain the cause of absence, and be duly dated and authenticated. When a pupil is absent beyond three days, a note of explanation is expected to be sent to the Rector. Pupils must on no account leave school without a pass from the Rector.
- (3) When infectious disease is found to exist in a family, the Rector must be informed immediately, and the members of such family can only be admitted to school on producing a Medical Certificate.
- (4) (a) There is a school uniform which must be worn by girls attending the School.
 - (b) Regulation Rugby Football, Cricket and Gymnastic Clothing must be provided.
 - (c) All Clothing, Books, etc., must be marked with the owner's name.
 - (d) Boys are expected to wear School Colours with shorts or grey flannels, or highland dress.
 - (e) Old school uniform should not be given away in the town. It should be brought to school, and will be sent to charitable institutions elsewhere.
- (5) Pupils attending the School are not allowed to smoke. The co-operation of parents is particularly requested in enforcing this rule.

These fees cover tuition and charges for writing, drawing, and science materials, but do not cover special subjects which are detailed below.

Note.—All children of Ministers of Religion will be charged two-thirds of the above fees.

Quarter Days-August 31st, November 10th, January 31st, April 19th.

All fees are payable quarterly in advance, and payment is to be made at the Treasurer's Office, 93 Commercial Street, Dundee. Hours—10 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily; Saturdays, 10 a.m. to 12 noon. In the case of new enrolments in Class I of the Lower School, the fee for the first quarter must be paid on acceptance of a vacancy, the fee not to be repayable in the case of subsequent withdrawal.

Notice of the withdrawal of a pupil during the Session must be given in writing to the Rector not later than one calendar month before the end of a quarter. Pupils not intending to return to School at the beginning of a Session must give notice to that effect not later than the previous 1st of June, but this does not apply to those in Forms V and VI. An additional quarter's fees must be paid if the requisite notice of withdrawal has not been given.

Pupils entering the School for the first time in the course of a quarter will be charged at the rate of one-seventh of a quarter's fee in respect of every week or part thereof from the date of entry to the end of the quarter.

No rebate will normally be granted in respect of the absence of a pupil on account of sickness or other cause, but in the event of prolonged absence on account of sickness or accident the Directors reserve the right to remit a proportion of the fees.

When more than three pupils attend from any one family, every pupil after the third is charged only half the inclusive fee, with the exception of those covered by the note above.

The Directors reserve the right to alter the foregoing regulations during the Session and to vary the fees for all or any of the Classes on giving one month's notice prior to any quarter day.

II. LOCKERS-

Girls who wish to have the use of a Locker at School must, at the beginning of the Session, deposit 2/- with the Lady Warden. This deposit will be returned when the pupil gives up her key at the end of the Session.

For the use of a Locker in the Recreation Pavilion pupils are charged 3/-

for either Winter or Summer Season, or 5/- for the year.

ANNUAL REPORT BY THE RECTOR

to the

Directors of the High School of Dundee

High School of Dundee, July, 1954.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

There have been 942 enrolments during the session, compared with 933 for the previous year. The Lower School is as full as ever, and seems likely to remain so for some years to come. Although some falling off in numbers takes place usually about the end of Form I and again after Form III, it looks as if there will be a small increase in the Upper School next year, chiefly due to a larger Form VI.

Attendance has been good, although there have been some of the usual minor epidemics. It is with much regret, however, that I have to record the recent death of Margaret Scott, Class Lower VI, after an illness of some months. Our sympathy goes out to her parents in their great loss.

Both Mr Duke and Mr Laird have been off for a time with quite serious illnesses, but have now recovered, while Mrs Marshall, who took ill during the summer term, has decided to give up the work which she came to do temporarily during the war.

In work we have had a most successful session. The general standard has been well maintained throughout the School, and Leaving Certificate results have been distinctly good. In Higher Science, for example, all candidates passed, though we followed our usual practice of presenting every one who seemed to have any chance at all; and in other subjects awards surpassed expectations. At the St. Andrews Bursary Competition we gained three places on the list (including the Dundee Educational Trust Scholarship), and would have had another if the candidate had been able to accept. That list, it should be remembered, is not a Merit List. The University authorities consider that so many conditions are attached to the award of particular bursaries that they cannot in fairness publish an order of merit. At University College, Dundee, where a merit list is published, first, second, third, and ninth places were taken by High School pupils.

Former pupils at the Universities and elsewhere continue to bring distinction to their old School. Among results already known, Lawrenson, at St. Andrews, is first in Special Physics, and first equal with Iain Main in Junior Honours Physics; Cullen is first in General

Mathematics (gaining the Carstairs prize), second in Latin and second in Greek; Pat Forrest has graduated Ch.M. (with Honours), in addition to his many previous distinctions; Joan Perry has graduated M.D.; at University College, David Tweedie is jointmedallist in Scots Law, and Elizabeth Menzies has gained her Ph.D. in History; Joan Stirling has gained the Franco-Scottish prize in French; at Glasgow, J. T. Lyon has been awarded second prize in Scottish History and Literature; George Davie, of the Philosophy Department of Queen's University, Belfast, has received his D.Litt. In other spheres, Ian Stark passed out of Sandhurst in February as first cadet of the R.E.M.E. regiment; Donald Menzies has gained the London City and Guild's Gold Medal and the Special Textiles Prize of the College of Distributive Trades. Many others have completed their degrees in various faculties, and we wish them every success in their careers. We would also congratulate Miss May Andrew, Headmistress of James Gillespie's School for Girls, and our late chairman, ex-Lord Provost Black, on receiving the C.B.E., and Jack Duncan on his appointment as private secretary to the Governor-General of the Sudan.

At the beginning of the session we welcomed three new members of staff. Miss Isobel Anderson took over Mrs McKenzie's work in Mathematics, Miss Leighton replaced Miss Spreull (now Mrs Grant) in Gymnastics, and Miss Coull joined the Preparatory Department in place of Mrs M. Thomson. We have been very fortunate with these appointments, doubly so when one considers the present difficulties of staffing. All have fitted so easily and quickly into their new work that is hard to realise that they have been with us for only a year. I should like also to thank Mrs Lickley for the excellent work she has done in the Junior Department during the period of her temporary employment, and to wish her well for the future.

There are, unfortunately, more changes to record. At Easter Mr Wood was appointed Principal Teacher of Science at the Grove Academy. It was well deserved promotion, but a marked loss to the Science Department, which he had served with distinction and success for fourteen years. It was also a blow to Rugby enthusiasts, as, apart from the war years, Mr Wood had coached the first XV with eagerness and skill. He will be very much missed, but we wish him happiness and success in his new post. Mr Robertson also left at the end of March to join the Modern Languages staff of Dollar Academy. During his brief stay he showed himself a keen and capable teacher with many varied interests, and his influence met with a ready response from L 7 Boys, both in School and at the field. We wish him and Mrs Robertson all good fortune.

Miss Coutts, for domestic reasons, is retiring from her post in the Music Department. She has given thirty-six years of devoted service to the School, during which she has proved herself a musician and teacher of rare quality. Individual pupils responded quickly to

her skilful guidance, and her class teaching and concert work were original and imaginative. At the Gilbert and Sullivan operas she acted as accompanist and wardrobe mistress, and gave unstintedly of her time in all the training and rehearsals. For many years she was an officer of the Guides and continued to help even in recent sessions. Her enthusiasm and friendship will remain fresh in our memories, and we wish her a long period of happiness and leisure. Miss MacDonell, who has taught in the English and Classics Departments for seven years, is leaving to be married. Her work has been very valuable, for she taught not only English, but Geography, Latin, and Greek. Such versatility we cannot hope to see again, while it will also be difficult to emulate her energy and cheerfulness. In the class-room and at Dalnacraig she has always been ready to give of her best, and she takes with her our best wishes for much happiness.

The time has also come for us to part with Mrs Marshall. Before her marriage Mrs Marshall was an Assistant Mistress in the Preparatory Department, to which she returned during the war to help us in the difficulties of the time; and she has been with us ever since. She has always been devoted to her work and to the children under her charge, and bound to them by ties of real interest and affection. The success of the Sale of Work in 1949 was largely due to Mrs Marshall's unremitting enthusiasm and effort, and on countless occasions she has helped generously with social functions. We hope that she will very soon be completely restored to health, and would thank her for all she has done. In her case it is not really good-bye. In recent weeks we have had Miss Bain with us again, deputising for Mrs Marshall. It has been like old times to go to her room, and her help has been very valuable.

Mrs Jack, who has looked after our creature comforts with singular success for the past eighteen years, is retiring from the post of Cook-Manageress of the Dining Hall. When she came, about fifty lunches were being served daily; now she has had to cater for approximately six hundred and twenty. This huge expansion meant scrapping the old premises and moving to the new dining-hall and kitchen in Ireland's Lane, with its up-to-date furnishings and equipment. It is mainly due to Mrs Jack that everything went so smoothly, and that we have forgotten the old difficulties in the well-geared efficiency of the new organisation. Mrs Jack was always ready to help, and her kind and obliging services were greatly appreciated. She has done a good job of work, and we hope she will long be spared to enjoy her retirement.

Mr T. D. G. Soutar was appointed to Mr Robertson's post, and after one term seems to be settling down happily. Next session we shall have Mr James Smart to assist in Science; Miss Muriel Sturrock in place of Miss Coutts; Miss Alison Hogg and Miss Amelia Cunningham, both old pupils, in place of Miss MacDonell and Mrs Marshall respectively. We hope they will enjoy their work.

We also look forward with pleasure to the return of Mr Ritchie after his long illness.

In games some teams have done well, while others have performed indifferently. The XV began with a series of defeats, but improved during the season, and finished with some notable victories. Junior teams did reasonably well. The hockey XI had an excellent season, and younger teams are full of promise. Cricket and tennis have been good, and have thrown up some first-rate performers who will undoubtedly attain the heights. Sports and Gala went off with great enthusiasm, especially those events which counted in the inter-house competition, which gives rise to a very healthy rivalry. Both Boys' and Girls' Literary Societies had successful seasons, with varied, enjoyable, and interesting programmes, for which I should like to thank not only School leaders but visiting speakers as well.

The Guides continue to play an important part in School activities. Their sale-of-work, by which they raised fully £200, is an admirable illustration of the principle of self-help. At the Guide Gala the junior team won the Challenge Cup, while the Seniors were runners-up for the senior trophy. Maureen Ritchie was a Scottish representative at the Reception at St. James's Palace, and she has won the Jean Coupar trophy as the best local member of the Junior Red Cross Link. The Cadet Company also has a noteworthy record, and numbers exceed two hundred for the first time in its history. Twenty-four cadets passed Certificate A Part I, and fifteen were successful in Part II. At Easter twenty-five cadets under Captain Larg spent ten days in Germany with the 1st Cameron Highlanders, and a party of eleven took an advanced training course at the Gordon Barracks, Aberdeen. The company put up an excellent appearance at the annual inspection, which was carried out by Brigadier Perceval of the Highland Command. While we did not succeed in retaining the Strathcona Shield this year, the rifle team did very well and there is good promise for the future. As last year, the Guides have gone to camp at Tarfside, and the Cadets to Cultybraggan, Comrie. hope they will have as good weather and as happy and profitable a time as they had last July.

The usual Carol Service was held in St. Mary's the Sunday before Christmas, and the quality of the singing was greatly appreciated by a large congregation. We are much indebted to our Chaplain, the Rev. H. O. Douglas, for the interest he takes in the School: both the Carol and the Easter services seem to have been permanently woven into the web of School life.

In June a performance of "The Importance of being Earnest" was given by senior pupils in the Training College hall. It seemed rather an ambitious venture, requiring as it does the capture of a somewhat alien atmosphere, lengthy memorising, quick movement and repartee. Mr Smith is to be congratulated on a smooth and

elegant production, and the cast deserves the highest praise. All the parts were convincingly played, and the speed of the action never faltered. It is good to know that there is so much talent ready to hand, and that some at least of the cast will be able to help with future productions. The décor and the mise-en-scène were excellent, and we are grateful for the generous help we received from friends outside the School. At the Lower School Prize-giving the Preparatory Department gave us a delightful concert. Both producers and performers are laying good foundations for the future in both singing and acting.

The activities I have mentioned call for a great deal of time and effort, and there are others too, which we more or less take for granted. I should like to record my thanks to all those whose energies are directed to the work of the class-room, to those in charge of games, athletics, swimming, Guides, Cadets, Societies, musical and dramatic productions, catering, and social functions, and for the administrative and clerical help which has been ungrudgingly given. My thanks are also due to the Directors who look so well after the interests of the School, and continue to keep for it a warm place in their hearts.
