

PROSPECTUS

Session 1964-65

THE HIGH SCHOOL OF DUNDEE consists of two Schools—a Boys' School and a Girls' School—and provides a complete course of primary and secondary education for both boys and girls. The Boys' School has a Cadet Corps and a Rifle Club, and the Girls' School a Company of Girl Guides. There is a School Literary Society, a School Magazine and a School Library. The School is inspected by the Scottish Education Department.

School Hours

The School Hours extend, in the case of Class L.I, from 9 a.m. to 12.45 p.m.; in L.II to L.VI, from 9 a.m. to 3.10 p.m., in the other Classes, from 9 a.m. to 3.55 p.m.

An Interval of One Hour is allowed for luncheon; Juniors 12.5 p.m. to 1.5 p.m., Seniors 12.45 p.m. to 1.45 p.m.

ORGANISATION

THE PREPARATORY DEPARTMENT

Classes L.I—L.III

THE JUNIOR DEPARTMENT

Classes L.IV-L.VII

The curriculum consists of Religious Instruction, English, Arithmetic, History, Geography, Art, Singing, Gymnastics, Junior Science, French, Handwork, and, for girls, Sewing.

THE SENIOR SCHOOL

Religious Instruction, Art, Singing, Gymnastics, Games are part of the syllabus throughout the Senior School. All girls in Forms I—III are taught Homecraft.

1. Forms I-II

Two main courses of instruction begin in Form I, both leading to the Scottish Certificate of Education (Ordinary Grade) in Form IV, the Scottish Certificate of Education (Higher Grade) in Form V, University Entrance, and the Professions.

A. English, History, Geography, French, Spanish, Latin, Mathematics, Science.

B. English, History, Geography, French, Spanish, Mathematics, Science, Technical Subjects (for boys), Homecraft (for girls).

Choice of course is determined by the pupil's Primary School record and by a Promotion Examination held in March.

In Form II, Greek, German and Commercial Subjects are added as alternatives to the curriculum.

2. Forms III—VI

Entry to this part of the Senior School and choice of subjects in it, are determined by the Class Examinations held in Form II in December and May.

In Form III, specialist courses in Music, Art, Homecraft and Geography may be begun.

Changes of curriculum in Form V, where necessary, are determined at the beginning of Session by the results of the Ordinary grade examination.

Special Subjects. In addition to the ordinary subjects of the curriculum, instruction is given in Pianoforte, Orchestral Instruments, Singing and Voice Production, Elocution and Dancing.

Reports. A Report of the progress of each pupil is sent to Parents or Guardians twice a year; a third special Report is sent where pupil's work or conduct is unsatisfactory.

Preparation of Lessons. Parents are urged to co-operate with the school by making time and quietness at home available for their children.

Health. All pupils are medically inspected periodically. When infectious disease is found to exist in a family, the Rector must be informed immediately, and the members of such family can be admitted to School only on producing a Medical Certificate.

Interviews. Parents who wish to see the Rector or the Lady Superintendent must make an appointment in advance. Parents who wish consultation about their children's progress in the Preparatory or Junior Departments must make appointments with Miss Knight or Mr. W. Smith through the Rector. Parents must not contact individual teachers directly. The school telephone number is 22465.

Entry

- 1. Entry to Class L.I is by interview and examination: these take place during the months of February and March. Application well in advance of the age of 5 is recommended, as there is always a long waiting list.
- 2. Entry to the Senior School is by an examination held in March, and by interviews which take place during April.
- 3. When vacancies occur elsewhere, examinations are held for the purpose.

Luncheon. Lunches are served daily at two sittings: the Junior Department and Preparatory Class L.III at 12.5, the Senior School and Preparatory Class L.II at 12.45. Admission to lunch is by ticket available for all school days in each quarter. The charge for the ticket—at the rate of 1/9 per meal—is included in the Quarterly Fee Account, and on payment of the Fees the Ticket is issued by the Treasurer. Pupils must have their tickets by the first day of each quarter and carry them regularly. They must be shown in the Dining Hall on request.

Adjustments in respect of five or more consecutive days' absence recorded in the School Register will be made in the following quarter's charge.

The Directors reserve the right to vary the charges for meals during the Session on giving one month's notice prior to any quarter day.

Should the holder discontinue attendance at meals, intimation should be made to the Rector and the ticket surrendered at the Treasurer's office, where repayment will be made in respect of any unexpired period after the date of surrender.

Cakes, scones, etc., can also be purchased at the forenoon break.

DATES OF HOLIDAYS, 1964-65

Christmas. The School will close on 23rd December, 1964, and re-open on 6th January, 1965.

Easter. The School will close on 2nd April, 1965, and re-open on 20th April, 1965.

Summer. The School will close on 1st July, 1965.

SESSION 1965-1966 will start on 31st August, 1965.

These fees cover tuition and charges for writing, drawing, and science materials, but do not cover special subjects which are detailed below.

Note.—All children of Ministers of Religion will be charged two-thirds of the above fees.

Ouarter Days-August 31st, November 9th, February 1st, April 26th.

All fees are payable quarterly in advance, and payment is to be made at the Treasurer's Office, 93 Commercial Street, Dundee. Hours—10 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily. In the case of new enrolments in Class L.I of the Preparatory Department, the fee for the first quarter must be paid on acceptance of a vacancy, the fee not to be repayable in the case of subsequent withdrawal.

Notice of the withdrawal of a pupil during the Session must be given in writing to the Rector not later than one calendar month before the end of a quarter. Where parents know for certain earlier that their children will be leaving, it is a great convenience to the Rector if he knows. Pupils not intending to return to School at the beginning of a Session must give notice to that effect not later than the previous 1st of June, but this does not apply to those in Forms V and VI. An additional quarter's fees must be paid if the requisite notice of withdrawal has not been given.

Pupils entering the School for the first time in the course of a quarter will be charged at the rate of one-seventh of a quarter's fee in respect of every week or part thereof from the date of entry to the end of the quarter.

If a Quarter is entered upon, the fees for the whole quarter must be paid.

No rebate will normally be granted in respect of the absence of a pupil on account of sickness or other cause, but in the event of prolonged absence on account of sickness or accident the Directors reserve the right to remit a proportion of the fees.

When more than three pupils attend from any one family, every pupil after the third is charged only half the inclusive fee, with the exception of those covered by the note above.

The Directors reserve the right to alter the foregoing regulations during the Session and to vary the fees for all or any of the Classes on giving one month's notice prior to any quarter day.

II. LOCKERS

Girls who wish to have the use of a Locker at School must, at the beginning of the Session, deposit 2/- with the Lady Superintendent. This deposit will be returned when the pupil gives up her key at the end of the Session.

ANNUAL REPORT BY THE RECTOR

to the

Directors of the High School of Dundee

High School of Dundee, 29th June, 1964.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

It is not possible within the scope of this Report to record for you all the details of the School's activity, and if I have omitted anyone who could reasonably have hoped to be mentioned by name I apologise in advance. Academically the details are largely contained elsewhere in the Prospectus—in the School Prize List and the Scottish Certificate of Education results. I hope you will agree with me that they show a good year, which has resulted in a Sixth Form this Session of high standard. It was therefore a good time for Her Majesty's Inspectors to choose for their official Inspection of the School, the first for nearly nine years. The part of their Report which dealt with the situation they found existing in the School, while not indicating perfection, was very favourable, which was both a relief and an encouragement to us all. But a considerable part of the Report and the conversations I had with individual Inspectors was concerned with the future development of the School; and I am happy to remind you that most of their suggestions were already accounted for in memoranda I have been submitting to you over a period. Because these matters have been very much in my mind, this Report is likely to be concentrated more on what is new and fluid than on what is more static.

When in my 1960 Report I announced officially that the Reconstruction was completed I thought indeed that during my tenure of office at least and possibly for ever on our confined site expansion was finished: yet on June 8th of this year workmen began to strip the roof from the Art Room and we were in the midst once again of the dislocations that Reconstruction demands. I ought first of all in the name of the present generation of pupils and those who will come after them to congratulate you, ladies and gentlemen, on your boldness in undertaking such development at a time when building costs are rising and your foresight in getting on with the work as soon as possible before they get out of hand. Whenever a building as old and as full of tradition as ours is reconstructed there is bound to be some sentimental loss, and many of us will be sorry to say farewell to the Art Room where it seems Art was first taught in Dundee.

But we are taking the opportunity as we move the artists a few feet heavenwards of making three fully modern Art rooms, while in the new middle floor there will be a Science laboratory, which we need for the new Science curriculum but which will be specially equipped for Biology teaching as and when we decide to develop Science along that line, an English room and a Geography room. These rooms will pioneer the latest mechanisms in visual and aural teaching which I intend to make a feature all through the School. We were lucky in that, before School finance became preoccupied with the Reconstruction you granted me in March a sum of money for the purpose. This will mean that by the beginning of next Session teaching by television, tape-recorder, episcope, radio, record player, and film projector will be available: this will affect in varying measure English, History, Geography, Modern Languages, Mathematics, Science, Art, the Junior Department, and the Preparatory Department.

A less spectacular, but no less useful bit of Reconstruction is now being undertaken in the Technical classroom. The room has already been relit, and during this holiday will be divided into two. For the labour involved in this division we are indebted to Mr. Fraser and his new assistant Mr. Forrest, who are doing the work themselves, doubtless with the assistance of the group of practically-minded boys who are ready to help the School in many useful ways. The coming of Mr. Forrest and the division of the Technical room will leave us poised to exploit the new Engineering syllabus and the developments in Technical subjects now starting: I know Mr. Fraser hopes to use these opportunities to maintain the glories of the High School Technical Department which you will find recorded in Mr. Alexander's article in the Brochure.

Junior Science is firmly established in the Junior Department, and the experiments in French teaching both there and in the Preparatory Department are being carried on with success and enthusiasm. In the Senior School the new Physics, Chemistry, and Mathematics are all being taught in the younger classes—it will, of course, be a year or two before these syllabuses affect the results at the top of the School. It is in a way sad when so many exciting things are happening in education that teachers cannot immediately reap the fruits of their labours: what is certain is that each year fewer pupils can blame lack of opportunity for any lack of success.

I am sure you are yourselves fully aware of what all this Progress means in terms of effort to the ladies and gentlemen of the Staff. Hardly one of them has been free from Educational Conference of one kind or another: and many of them have cheerfully undertaken courses in new techniques in teaching their subjects or in what are virtually new subjects. As this is in

addition to the part they play in the general life of the School. I am sure that pupils, parents, and Directors are as grateful to them as I am. In spite of these extra duties, I am glad to report that the health of the Staff has been very good. Only Miss Reekie. Miss Pae and Miss Nicoll suffered seriously during the Session. and I am glad to report that they are all back at work, though I could wish Miss Reekie enjoyed greater fitness than she does. Last year when I recorded the waygoing of four members of Staff, I thought this was for us an unusually high loss, but seemingly not: for ere this summer is out we shall have said good-bye to seven of our number. During last autumn term Miss Foggie expectedly and Miss McNaughton because of the sudden death of her sister-in-law retired from the Staff. I need hardly tell you, for most of you had experience of it personally. of the excellent service both rendered to the School in their respective positions and how well they have earned their leisure. At the end of this Session Miss Derrick and Miss Ritchie leave to get married. Miss Henderson, Miss Paton, and in September Miss Cairneross also leave us to seek their fortunes in Aberdeen High School, Aberdeen College of Education, and St. Margaret's School, Edinburgh. Their going, though sad for us, is also a matter of pride; for they go to posts of responsibility, and we can claim at least some share in their success. The appointment of two whole-time lady teachers to the Physical Education Department has also meant that Mrs Catto and Mrs Patterson will be leaving the Department. To all these ladies we wish the best of fortune, and hope they will remember with pleasure the service they gave to the High School. In these days of staffing shortages, a Headmaster, however much he may wish his Staff to succeed, is bound to hear of all resignations with apprehension; but we are still fortunate in being able to appoint for these ladies substitutes who are fully adequate to carry on their work. So I welcome to the Staff as replacements Mr. Bell, Mr. Hunter, Miss Tatton, Miss Worsley, and Miss McArthur, and to fill newly created posts Mr. Forrest and Miss Patrick. Miss Knight was appointed to succeed Miss McNaughton as Head of the Preparatory Department last autumn, and is now well established in her work.

I need not remind you that all the organisation which has taken up this Report so far is the setting for the education and happiness of the pupils of the School. But before I go on to tell of their progress I wish on your behalf to thank those who assist me in ensuring that the organisation works. The fuller the curriculum in the widest sense that we offer the harder the work of organisation is, and I am grateful to Miss Gray, Mr. Stewart, my Secretary, and Mr. Stark in general, and Head Masters and Head Mistresses in their particular spheres for all they do. Without their help, I am sure the machine would sometimes grind to a full stop.

There were 1,107 pupils in the School last Session, 231 in the Preparatory Department, 314 in the Junior Department, and 562 in the Senior School. The fact that the numbers are approximately the same as last year is a reminder to you that the School is full everywhere. And the waiting lists and the number of those who fail to find places never seem to get less. Last year I attempted some analysis of the classroom work so far as it was reflected in External Examination results. I refer you again to this, for the facts have not changed to any marked extent. Nor have the meaning of these facts—much effort on the part of many pupils, and good results, not only for those who are endowed with good brains but for those also who are prepared to work hard to compensate for average or less than average natural ability; and a hard core, not very large but appreciable in size, of pupils who dislike work and are prepared to sacrifice their prospects in the future for the sake of their dislike. The terminal Reports leave no doubt as to the identity of these pupils. As the energy of the Staff has often to be concentrated on them beyond what is a fair proportion of the time available, I claim from their parents a special measure of help and co-operation.

Individual pupils continue to bring honour to the School. It is not often that we break down the doors to Oxbridge, but I am happy to report that we did this Session and at the very centre when Sandy Davie won a Major Scholarship in Mathematics last December to Pembroke College, Cambridge. Edinburgh University no longer issues an order of merit for its Entrance Bursaries, but Ian Smith was named first in the General Subjects list and I suspect would have had a very high position in the old list. As Grahame Lees won a Bursary to Queen's College, and Penelope Rogers the Bonar Scholarship to St. Salvator's College, we can congratulate ourselves on a good year. I think it is right that I should inform you that results now, and it seems likely in the future, cannot be equated to the results of the past in the Bursary Competitions. Government generosity in grants has often removed the financial attractiveness of an Open Bursary, and has made entry a free choice; and in these conditions it sometimes seems more profitable to a future career to concentrate in the Sixth Form on work which is not directly applicable to the Bursary Competition. I further record the success of Ian Smith and James Coull in winning the English Speaking Union Public Speaking Competition for Scottish Schools. We have been solid supporters of this Competition since its inception because we believe in the importance of public speaking as a part of education and have managed to represent the Midlands in the Finals three times; I was therefore particularly happy that it was "third time lucky". I am grateful to the Rotary Club of Dundee for using the opportunity of this success to invite Ian Smith to address them, and for inviting the other School Prefects and myself as guests to hear him. The high standard of Ian's speech on this occasion was, I think, an eye opener to many Rotarians.

The highlight of the School's artistic life during the Session was the celebration of the quater-centenary of Shakespeare's birth. The Senior Dramatic Society co-operated with Dundee Education Authority in its Schools' celebration by acting scenes from "Romeo and Juliet". Inside the School we held a Shakespearean Dinner in the School Dining Hall, at which Michael Tosh, our best English scholar of this generation, came back from Oxford to speak the laudation to Shakespeare. Here I would digress for a moment to express the School's thanks to Miss Chalmers and her Staff not only for their normal service to the School, but for their willingness to help us in our special functions. The celebrations culminated in an amalgam of song. drama, dance and decor which I called "Tribute to Shakespeare". I used the variety of Shakespearean artistic production to link together all the artistic organisations of the School into a combined operation: I am sure no one who saw it doubted its success. Because of the Reconstruction we have had this year to divide our Exhibitions into two parts. We hope to produce an Exhibition of Art and Gymnastics in the autumn when the new Art rooms are ready. Meantime you have had a chance of seeing those Exhibitions which it has been possible to hold now— I am sure you will agree that they are all of that standard of excellence we have grown to accept as normal.

Perhaps the most interesting development in games during the Session has been the introduction of hockey to a group of senior boys for whom Rugby and Swimming seem to be unsuitable. The interest lay, not so much in the fact that they played, but that they played very well, and that other Schools seemed to be only too anxious to give us fixtures. The ground that was available at Monymusk was not very good, but work on it during the summer and a realignment of the 1st XV Rugby pitch will produce a good pitch next Session, and boys' hockey will be a regular feature at 1st and 2nd XI level. We have also been able through the possession of the Monymusk tennis courts to advance tennis playing among boys. It is satisfactory, too, that we have been able to start inter-school netball matches for girls, and that a Sailing Club has been formed. In general, the greatest satisfaction to me lies in the continued increase in the number of pupils playing in matches in the various games even over the record numbers of last year. The increase is specially marked in Hockey and Tennis among the girls and in Athletics for both boys and girls—the present enthusiasm for Athletics is very marked. Of individual successes I record for you that Roger Burns, Peter Bruce, Harvey Findlay, and Murray Petrie played for the Midland Schools Rugby XV, that the 1st girls Hockey XI won the Midlands Inter-Schools Championship

Cup for the second year in succession, the Tennis girls VI have won the Midlands Schools Tennis Shield, the boys Tennis VI have won the Midlands Schools Tennis Tournament, and Helen Lyle is Midlands Tennis Champion. It is perhaps too easy for us, when we are thinking of the quality and quantity of the School's games, to forget those who make it all possible by their faithful care of Dalnacraig and Monymusk. It happens that for one reason or another those who previously served the School in this way have all left in the past few years and there is a new team. Those who see the grounds know how effective their work is, and I know how loyally they serve. I would like therefore in the School's name to thank them all, and particularly Mr. Connor who is in charge.

In commenting on the excellent work which continued to be done by the School C.C.F. and the Guides, I have first to strike a note of regret. Mr. Howat has felt it necessary to resign from the C.C.F. and Miss Gray from the Guides. Both have served the School well, for a long period of service, and while both organisations will certainly miss them it is our part to thank them that for so long they have sacrificed their leisure in the School's interest. I am glad to report that Mr. Bell has already joined the Cadets and Mr. Coletta is in process of doing so, and that Miss Worsley and Miss Patrick will be helping with the Guides next term. The work of the Officers of the C.C.F. is supported by generous help from other members of the Staff and friends of the School and from the Regular and Territorial Units in the Dundee Area—for all of which we are most grateful. I am glad therefore to tell you that the Cadets are being most satisfactorily and adequately led and trained: and now that as a result of the reconstruction of all Pre-Service Training Units throughout Great Britain the War Office has granted us a generous establishment—a tribute in itself to the reputation we have—we can look forward to a promising future. This is particularly so now that a technical course in motor running and maintenance, metalwork and carpentry, and the Duke of Edinburgh's Award have been dovetailed into C.C.F. training. In this connection I congratulate David Fairley and Hugh Ramsay on being the first High School boys to have gained the Duke of Edinburgh's Gold. The success of the Cadets I can best attest by quoting from the official report sent us by last year's Inspecting Officer—"This Unit has reached a standard which it will be extremely difficult to maintain"; and by telling you what this year's Inspecting Officer told me—"The Unit is as good as it ever can have been". Because this is so, and because I believe that nothing is so good for training a boy in deportment, self-reliance, and good discipline, quite apart from any potential patriotic motive, I am surprised that so many parents neglect the opportunity the C.C.F. provides. It happens that we are now able to increase our numbers, both in the pre-cadet unit and in the C.C.F. proper, and I would advise parents to give this matter serious thought. So far as the Guides are concerned, their efficiency also is not in doubt: indeed we have at the moment in School 22 Queen's Guides. But we are not so well off for officers. The troop is extremely large, and the officers, both from the Staff and from the Old Girls, have performed heroics. But there are not enough of them, and I have had to face the possibility of cutting down the numbers radically to fit the officer strength. I am sure you, and very many parents, would look on this as tragic indeed. I am sure there are parents and Old Girls who will be glad to help us now that I have pointed out the need—the High School Guides deserve every support.

As both Cadets and Guides are essentially other-regarding, this is the proper place to tell you of the progress we are making in Service to the Community, apart from the service we have always done—Christmas Parcels and the like. We are at the beginning of a Social Service plan for senior pupils in Dundee, which will I hope add fame to the City throughout the country, and as part of this plan 50 High School pupils will be serving the community in one capacity or another during the summer. This is a great work. I would like to record the work of Grahame Lees here, for on him has fallen the main burden of organisation in the School.

So far I have been reporting what I might perhaps call the soul of the School and its pupils. Before I end my Report by a paragraph on the friends of the School, I would like to comment on its outward appearance. I am well aware that a prudent Rector would lie quietly low on a subject so explosive as School uniform, and that brickbats are my most likely reward for not taking my own advice. But being convinced that High School pupils deserve the best modern style in uniform available, and being emboldened by the favourable comments, often from strangers, on the summer frocks, I have taken the plunge, and am at least reasonably content to let history be my judge.

The School's best friends have often been its own Old Boys and Old Girls. I have long been discontented at the enormous gaps in our knowledge of how our F.P.s are faring. To rectify this I am now engaged on the task of recording the career of every Former Pupil who will send me the facts. I am heartened in this work by the many letters I have received from F.P.s now scattered to the ends of the earth, and from others whose schooldays go a long way back indeed. But there are still hundreds of F.P.s, many of them in Dundee, who have not sent me information about themselves, and I would appeal to them to ask me for forms and fill them up—and to send them to their friends. I will not be satisfied until and unless I have a complete account of every Old Boy and Old Girl of the School. Out of this grew an idea that the School might send some account of itself

in brochure form to all its sons and daughters. I am grateful here to four gentlemen of the Staff who have been largely responsible for preparing the Brochure, and to the Old Boys' and Old Girls' Clubs who raised most of the cost by a Coffee Evening in the autumn. The Brochure is now in the hands of the printers, and we will get it out as soon as we get time, not only to F.P.s, but to parents as well.

It is particularly pleasant when we are thinking of our friends that a larger number of them than usual should be thinking of us. I record with gratitude that Miss McNaughton has sent prizes for the duxes in L.I and L.II, that Sheriff Inglis has presented a Music Prize, that Mrs Johnston, President of the Old Girls' Club, has presented two prizes for the Junior School, to be given if possible in L.IV to the boy and girl who has tried hardest during the Session, that Dr. and Mrs Taylor Brown have founded a prize, to be known as the Alexander Mill White Prize. for the best all-round boy or girl in Form I, and that an anonymous friend of the School has founded a book prize to be added to the Harris medal for the Dux of the School. We are also grateful to Miss Paton who has presented a cup for the girls' Inter-House Hockey competition, and to Mr. Larg and Mr. Vannet for presenting the Larg Vannet Trophy to the Cadets for shooting in the Junior Company. Finally, I wish to thank Brigadier Snowball for inspecting the C.C.F., Mr. and Mrs J. H. R. Wright for officiating at the Sports, Mr. and Mrs Recordon for officiating at the Gala, Mrs Johnston for addressing the Junior School at its Prize-Giving, the Lord Provost for addressing the Senior Prize-Giving and the Lady Provost for giving away the prizes, Mrs Menelaws for judging the Junior Reading Prizes, Professor Adams for judging the Senior Reading Prizes, and Mr. Hinchcliffe for judging the Music Prizes.

And so, ladies and gentlemen, with my sincere thanks to you for your service to the School and to myself, and in the hope that you will find from this Report that the School is in good heart,

- 1. ALEXANDER EDWARD'S BEQUEST for the education of children, giving a preference to those whose parents have been employed at the Works of A. & D. Edward & Co. The Bursaries are tenable for four years, and entitle the holder to free education at the school.
- EDWARD BURSARY FUND for the education of one or more pupils at the High School.
- ANDERSON SCHOLARSHIPS.—These Scholarships of about £30
 each are tenable at the University of St. Andrews by pupils who have
 attended the High School for not less than two years immediately preceding the Competition.
- 4. THE MISSES BAXTER'S (OF BALGAVIES) SCHOLARSHIP.—
 Two Scholarships of £40 for one year at the University of Edinburgh in Science or Engineering and renewable for two or three years in certain circumstances. - 2. THE SPENCE BURSARIES.—These Bursaries are open to students of Classics or Mathematics who have completed one academic year in the Faculties of Arts or Science. They are tenable for two years and are open to men and women studying in the Universities of Edinburgh or St. Andrews (including Dundee) and are awarded on the results of a competitive examination by the Governors of the Spence Bursary Trust. Full particulars of the Bursaries available in any year and of the conditions of examination, award and tenure may be obtained from the Factor of the Trust, Mr. R. W. Matthewson, B.L., C.A., 1 Bank Street, Dundee. Entry forms may be obtained from the Factor. The examination is held in June in two centres, namely, Edinburgh and St. Andrews. No payment in respect of a Spence Bursary will be made which would bring the recipient's Bursary income to above £160.

A Continuation Bursary of the value of £50, tenable for one year, may be granted to any holder of a Spence Bursary of whose merit and progress the Governors are satisfied, provided the Bursar's course of study is approved by the Governors.

3. EDINBURGH ANGUS CLUB—DALHOUSIE BURSARIES.—Two Bursaries of £40 per annum for three or four years. Tenable in Arts at Edinburgh University. Preference is given to natives of Angus or to candidates who have been educated at a School or Schools in the County for not less than five years.
